

MINISTER'S CORNER

"Why is play so elusive for some grown-ups? Because we are so strongly attracted and attached to a profoundly goal-oriented, work-ethic-driven society. Like other forms of non-work, play connotes wastefulness, a stoppage in the way of what needs to be done. Yet often what really needs to get done has more to do with our hearts and spirits and less to do with a deadline or longstanding project. Play beckons to us, urging us to live in the present moment, a moment that becomes more luminous when we allow interruptions like work and worry." (Leslie Levine)

The Soul Matters theme for this month is Play - something I think we do far too little of (I'm preaching to myself, here). As a grandmother to 6-month old twins, I am relearning how important play is for human development. As the girls reach for their toes, giggle at the stimulation of blowing raspberries on their bellies and necks, and snuggle their 'lovey' toys, they develop focus and coordination, interaction and joy.

May we remember that play is our first way of knowing the world around us. May we discover the play within our work and honor the work of play, that we might, with Robert Frost, affirm: "But yield who will to their separation / my object in living is to unite / my avocation and my vocation / as my two eyes make one in sight. / Only where love and need are one, / and the work is play for mortal stakes, / is the deed every really done / for heaven and the future's sakes." BOARD REPORT

Last August, I saved this quote to remind me that our church has a mission to make the world a better place. "The Church has an opportunity to show the world what healthy people do in times of crisis. Rather than panic and devolve into self-absorption and self-protection, we run toward the needs in our culture rather than away from them. We refuse to demonize others, but act out the story of the Good Samaritan on a daily basis. Local churches can lead the way to show their communities what 'love your neighbor as yourself' actually looks like."



So how has this manifested?

The Little Free Pantry comes to mind with a change in leadership, Dian Tucker purchasing shelving and the renovation of the back closet to a professional looking pantry. As one of our young people said, wow, they are taking their commitment really seriously. Thank you to the pantry people who have not just maintained the pantry but helped it too thrive in the most challenging of times when the needs of the community were immense.

The Villages: led by Angela Warren and a host of others has helped to keep us all connected and supported.

The Caring for one another team has been amazing. They are really a special group.

The Board created a medical team to assist us in being safe and to guide our re-opening.

The Board created technical support through Joce Kofke to aid our community who are not well versed in technology to stay connected to our zoom meetings, church services and much more.

In August the Board chose three areas to focus on so that we could accomplish something tangible during the most challenging of times. In partnership with the Endowment Trust, we accumulated \$62,000. The facilities team brought to the congregation the architectural team that will he assessing our next steps. We will be investing \$35,000 to get a product that will inform our future. The sign task force is on the way. Meeting last Saturday, we recognized in our enthusiasm, we brought it forward a little too soon. There is much to be done. The good news is we have some designs to choose from and the devil is in the details! Location, trenching for electrical, meeting with the town to discuss size and location, etc. Two new members were added to the team: retired architect, Richard Rose and retired engineer, Barry Kent. As for the Green Living team, they are moving forward with a planned festival in October, applied for a grant to help support it. Be on the lookout ahead as there are many exciting things to be a part of!

Technology ahead: We are exploring hybrid church: in other words, both on line and in person church. We will need to upgrade our technology. I wrote and received a NYSCU grant for \$1700, but that is the tip of the iceberg. I am in the process of writing a chalice lighter grant for additional funding. It is due August 1st but we will not find out until mid-September. Stay tuned.

Funding the 3 foci: People have been generous and I hope you will consider digging a little deeper if you are able. Some people designated where the money was to go and we must honor that. In so doing, it tied our hands and left the sign underfunded. Why a sign? Well, it will give us the opportunity to have continuous communication to the larger community. We can share not just what we stand for, but events, weddings and other aspects of church life that show us to be a vibrant and hence attractive community to become a part of. Some feel, "it's just a sign." It is so much more!

Thank you to the friends who have helped with the generosity drive. Amazingly, we have \$203,000 pledged. The fixed costs currently are \$173,000. That gives us \$33,000 for everything else. At this point, unless we increase revenue, we are looking at a deficit budget. There are still a few outstanding pledges. Please consider getting it in so we can present a true budget and reduce the deficit.

Les, Scott, Lauraine and the technology team have been amazing in keeping us connected with the services and online programming.

Our staff has been incredible through these most challenging times. Thank you to Elaine, Camilla, Chris and Joce. Our gratitude goes to our per diem musician, Adam. Rev. Michelle has been beyond amazing through this turbulent year. We are most grateful to have someone who is not just dedicated, but visionary as well. We are truly blessed.

Board report continued

I am sure I have forgotten many, but please know you are loved and appreciated for all you do for UU Amherst.

As far as re-opening, the medical team along with Rev. Michelle and the Board are working together to create a safe re-opening. As well, we are looking into hybrid services to maintain connection and community with those who are either not vaccinated or those who find it difficult to physically attend.

Lastly, I want to thank this dedicated Board of Trustees: Don Tucker, Scott Harrigan, Wendy Scott, Laurie, Kasnicki, Emily Garrett, and Jeanine Moyer. You have been incredible to work with and I am honored to serve beside you. Completing their terms are Wendy Scott and Scott Harrigan. They will stay as part of the 3 foci teams they have led. We will miss their dedication and hard work on the Board, but know that they will be actively engage in the wider church community.

New members and inactive members returning from out of town will be qualified to vote in the fiscal year during which they joined or returned if they have made a recorded financial contribution to the church or pledged to make a financial contribution of any amount to the church for that fiscal year.

FAITH DEVELOPMENT

Dear UU Amherst members and friends,

June's Soul Matters theme of play reframed as spiritual practice encourages us to remember that we can write our own rules, that we can use escape to restore our freedom, and that we must practice returning to joy.

As we move through this season of reopening slowly and gently, let us not be light on PLAY! Yes, there is much to be done, and much to learn, but to echo Rev. Michelle's observations about how the youngest of us learns this way, before any other way, how to connect and move through the world, let us not forget to play, no matter what age we are. Lightheartedness and laughter need to be welcome as we relearn how to be together. That could be rule number one.

Are you looking forward to an escape coming up? A vacation? A long awaited visit with family or friends that you haven't seen in such a long time? We have begun to hear from members who have been doing just that. This long-awaited mingling certainly is a restoration of freedom to move about the world, to see people's whole faces, to hug, to have your grandbabies or nieces and nephews right up in your lap. Maybe you get to snuggle your friend's pet that you haven't seen in a long time. Blessings to all of you and yours as you explore one another once again! Certainly this is part of returning to joy

Yet this phrase "returning to joy" strikes a strange chord. How do I return to something that always should be present? THIS is why it is practice. We practice work and priorities each day, but what we really need to practice more is centering joy. So much of our culture is defined by what I call "punch the clock" mentality. We seem so much more prone to define ourselves by our work time instead of our play time. Each day I feel the call to prioritize, to decide what on the to-do list must be done first. Who is counting on me? When can I get THAT done? Is this even possible to accomplish? How will it all PLAY out? There is a phrase that I repeat to myself when it feels like I am a hamster in a wheel and I don't know how to stop running. We do without doing and everything gets done. Aka, we "go with the flow."

When our loyal crew showed up for one of our educational / grounds Saturday afternoons last month, we encountered the lawn service. Even though this was our allotted time to work, we had to wait. Did we throw our arms up and go away? No, we took the time to sit with one another and check in. We had some laughs, some stories, some truth telling about how scary our world can be. It was truly a joy to just BE together in a place that we all love so dearly. Then the mower finished the area where we needed to be, and we got to the intended tasks. Our work time was less, but we still did get things done, not least of all, connecting in patience and in joy.

COVID CORNER

Welcome to June 2021. The CDC released new guidance concerning COVID19 and mask wearing in May. Everyone is now confused...do you have to wear



a mask, inside, outside, social distance...have you been vaccinated? Can we restart church? NY just lifted the mask mandate, our medical team needs to take a look at the new guidelines and then plan accordingly for the safe reopening without leaving out members of our congregation who were unable to get vaccinated (people at high risk of complications and the youngest among us). The UUCA leadership will evaluate the new rules and decide when and how to reopen the campus. CARING FOR ONE ANOTHER RECIPES

Provided by Christine Boczarska and Faith Pham

Christine Boczarska and Faith Pham are sisters and dedicated members of our Caring For One Another group. They provide occasional meals to church members on an as-needed basis. With the meal they generally include a "goodie bag" and a card on behalf of the Caring Group. They often submit healthy recipes for the monthly *Foreword*. The recipes are easy and usually use fresh vegetables.

Adas Polo o Morgh

About two hours prep and cooking. Serves 4 to 6. This recipe can be made as a vegetarian dish or with chicken added. Adjust to your preference.

1 cup basmati rice
1/2 cup brown lentils, rinsed and picked over
4 to 6 boneless, skinless chicken thighs
1/4 tsp ground black pepper
Kosher salt
6 Tbsp ghee or unsalted butter, divided
1 medium yellow onion halved and thinly sliced
1/2 raisins, preferably golden
5 dates, preferably Medjool, pitted and quartered
(or 1/2 cup dried apricots, if preferred)
1/2 tsp ground cumin
1/4 tsp ground cinnamon
2 pinches saffron



In a medium bowl combine rice and lentils. Using very hot tap water, rinse grains 3 or 4 times. Cover grains with very hot tap water and set aside.

Season chicken with pepper and 1 tsp salt and set aside.

In a large Dutch oven or heavy-bottomed lidded pot set on high heat, melt 4 Tbsp of ghee or butter. Add onion and cook, stirring often with a wooden spoon, until onion is crisp and brown, 10 to 15 minutes. Stir in raisins and dates, remove from heat and allow them to soften, about 2 mlnutes. Transfer mixture to a small bowl and set aside. Return pot to high heat. Add chicken thighs in a single layer and cook 2 to 3 minutes on each side. Transfer chicken to a plate. Lower heat to medium. Drain rice and lentils and add to pot with 2 cups of water, the remaining 2 Tbsp of ghee or butter, 1 tsp salt, cumin, cinnamon and saffron. Increase heat to high and gently stir with a wooden spoon to incorporate the spices. Bring mixture to a boil.

Meanwhile, wrap the pot lid in a clean kitchen towel, waffle weave or terry cloth, securing it to the pot's handle with a knot or rubber band. (Necessary to absorb the steam.) Nestle chicken thighs on top of rice mix. Tightly cover pot with wrapped lid and lower heat to medium low. Steam until chicken is tender and rice is fluffy, 40 to 45 minutes. Check at 30 minutes to see if more water is needed; add 1/2 cup or more if needed.

To serve, add some of the onion-raisin mixture to the rice and serve the remainder on the side. Accompany dish with a fresh green salad and you have an aromatic dinner.
