

CARING FOR ONE ANOTHER RECIPES

Christine Boczarska and Faith Pham are sisters and dedicated members of our Caring For One Another group. They provide occasional meals to church members on an as-needed basis. With the meal they generally include a "goodie bag" and a card on behalf of the Caring Group. They often submit healthy recipes for the monthly *Foreword*. The recipes are easy and usually use fresh vegetables.

Here are two recipes that are simple to do, can save you money and enhance your cooking.

Making your own vanilla

Select a small bottle with a stopper. Fill the bottle with vodka. Scrape vanilla seeds from a vanilla bean pod into the bottle and add the vanilla bean pod as well. Shake well. Store this mixture on your spice shelf for 3 weeks before use, shaking it periodically. Use as you would store- bought vanilla. You will like the improved flavor.

Vanilla sugar

Take a vanilla bean and split or cut it open lengthwise. Fill a container with granulated sugar and add the opened vanilla bean. Shake well and store in your cupboard. The vanilla will permeate the sugar. Use the sugar to make cakes, cookies, berry mixes, whipping cream, granola, tea or coffee or whatever else you like.



"The Rule of International Law and the U.N.'s Agenda 2030"

The rule of international law is the foundation of the United Nations. On the international level, it is fundamental to international peace and security. All 193 United Nations Member States have an obligation to abide by the United Nations Charter and the wider body of international law. All 193 United Nations Member States are expected to abide by these laws and work to ensure that seeking world peace is the essence of the United Nations work to promote the rule of international law at the international level.

On 24 September 2012, the United Nations General Assembly adopted a Declaration emphasizing the importance of the rule of international law. The United Nations provides rule of international law assistance to over 150 United Nations Member States. The United Nations has also developed a large body of universally agreed upon norms and standards. The Declaration builds upon the fundamental formula of the 2005 United Nations World Summit. There is no peace without development; there is no development without peace; and there is no lasting peace and sustainable development without respect for human rights. The United Nations' challenge now is to implement this Declaration. Promoting the rule of international law is, therefore, an extremely important task for the United Nations. Coordinating this process is very difficult, given the large number of United Nations Member States and their usual intransigence. United Nations Secretary-General António Guterres is attempting to promote this process of coordination.

The challenge for the United Nations, therefore, will be to encourage all 193 United Nations Member States to implement the United Nations Agenda 2030 and the U.N.'s Sustainable Development Goals (SOGs). The U.N. Agenda 2030 and the United Nations Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs). The United Nations Agenda 2020 is devoted to enhancing the rule o international law and encourages all 193 United Nations Member States to abide by it. At the present time, most U.N. Member States abide by the rule of international law and the U.N. Charter only when it is compatible with their foreign policy objectives. That is why the United Nations is unfortunately of less importance that it ought to be.

The time to implement the U.N.'s agenda 2030 is now. This will help the international community give the rule of international law the central role it deserves in world affairs. The international community must develop new approaches to implement the rule of international law. The United Nations should help all 193 United Nations Member States to strengthen the rule of international law and ensure that abiding by the rule of international law promotes world peace, international security, and human rights—the primary purpose of the United Nations and its Charter. This is not an easy or simple task, but it needs to be accomplished if the human family is to endure and have a bright future. There is no time to lose: the United Nations must be made to work now.
