

BOARD REPORT

Dear Members and Friends.

The summer seems to be flying by as I write this for the September Newsletter. It was so good to be at the first in-person service after 16 months of Zoom or YouTube. It was interesting to feel my own reaction. In one sense, it was wonderful and in another, I felt a little sensory overload. It made me realize that we really are re-entering normal in a not so smooth, gentle way. I see the need to be more patient and compassionate for where we each are as we travel this path together. I did not feel the ability to step back in at the same energy level and clarity that I left 16 with months ago...This has taken a hidden toll that I didn't see coming. I hope your transitions are smooth and seamless.



If they aren't, please know you are not alone! We are all a part of the larger community. So, reach out, connect and share. It will only draw us closer...

Our board has been busily working through the summer. We had our leadership retreat in July and our first meeting in August. Scott Harrigan and Wendy Scott have agreed to stay connected through the board email and to continue on with the projects they were an integral part of starting. I am very grateful to them.

Our current board officers are: Bruce Becker, secretary; Don Tucker, vice-chair; Karen Thompson, chair, Jeanine Moyer, Laurie Kasnicki, Emily Garrett and Linda Gardner, at-large trustees. Emily Garrett is now the liaison to the Endowment Trust. Emily comes to them well qualified having an MBA. Linda Gardner joins the Nominating and Leadership Committee with Laurie Kasnicki; Bruce Becker leads Facilities, Don Tucker leads Personnel, Jeanine Moyer continues on with Committee on Mission and the Living Green Team; (see page 4 for an update on the Living Green Expo); and Karen Thompson continues on with the Finance Committee.

In June we received a NYSCU technology grant for \$1,760. To date we have purchased two video cameras. At the end of July, I submitted a Chalice Lighters Grant to upgrade our technology. We will not hear the outcome until their September meeting. In the short term, within the budget, we are in the process of upgrading our WIFI to make hybrid streaming smoother. This will be a year-long project of upgrading our infrastructure and replacing the worn equipment. If we receive this \$20,000 grant, we can boldly move forward.* There is a plan to assist those who struggle with technology. Our goal is to make sure no one is left behind. Currently, Joce Kofke is available for help. You can schedule through the office or directly with Joce. This is by appointment only. *Update: On August 19th, an email was sent through the All Church listserv notifying members that we will be receiving the grant.

I'm sure I will have more to share in the coming months as we come together and work toward fulfilling our mission. Stay tuned, stay connected and continue being the amazing church community I have come to know and love. Take loving care of yourselves as we navigate this ever-changing world. We've got this! Together!



Living Green Expo Postponed to Spring 2022

The Green Justice ministry team met on 8/17 and made the difficult decision to postpone the Living Green Expo, originally slated for the first weekend of October. With so much uncertainty and rising Covid infection rates, the team thought it prudent to err on the side of caution with this decision. UU Amherst takes our standing in the community seriously, and we want to model thoughtful leadership. The ensuing months will give us ample

opportunity to plan and implement an event that is both educational and entertaining as we share our Green values with the wider community. The Green Justice ministry team is alerting the New York State Convention of Universalists (NYSCU), the folks who so generously gave us a grant to support the Expo, that we are postponing until spring. At this time we do not know if we will need to return the grant funds and reapply.

The goats will still be working their magic in the back acreage of UU Amherst beginning September 27. The hoofed and horned landscapers (goats) will happily be munching invasive plant species 9/27-10/3, helping us achieve our land management goals, using Green technology!

FAITH DEVELOPMENT

Dear UU Amherst members and friends,

What does it mean to be a community that is Embracing Possibility? We are fortunate to have such an articulate leader in Rev. Michelle who offers this meaning: Possibility "calls us to engage the spiritual practice of nonattachment to outcomes."



The Green Justice Team / Living Green Expo planning team practiced this by listening to one another in the Circle Way, and came to a consensus to postpone our event. No one came to that meeting knowing that this would be the result. Though we look forward to truly engaging the larger community in the spring of 2022 instead of this fall, we also realize that even though we make goals, change and uncertainty continue to be the only constant themes of life. In fact, they are the Mothers of Possibility, and to embrace all of this is to be open to life itself.

Back in June, I reported that the Faith Development Team and the Committee on Mission had several meetings to revise our Mission and to come up with goals for this church year. Please embrace the Possibility that we will do whatever our best is during this time to achieve them and to live into our mission. If we fall short, we will refrain from blaming ourselves or others, or even the ongoing pandemic. We will accept that situations arise and do compromise best outcomes, even as we lean wholeheartedly into our mission To develop and promote opportunities for all ages that lead toward spiritual wholeness while creating an inclusive beloved community both within and beyond our congregation.

Our FD Team's S.M.A.R.T. goals for this church year are as follows:

- Engage the youth and young adults to participate in the Living Green Expo planned for October 2021 / May / June 2022 with at least one youth and one young adult involved in planning and implementation.
- Support at least four Faith Development programs that join adults in community to experience and/or lead discussions on topics related to the UU Amherst mission over the 2021-22 church year.
- Enhance Faith Development (FD) Team leadership by explicitly inviting and including a leader of a Lifespan FD program in every other FD Team meeting for the coming year.
- Invite one or more members of Central East Regional Leadership to connect directly to the FD team during Summer-Fall 2021 to collaborate with us on best post-pandemic practices.

Already, our first goal has changed. And that is okay. The timing gives us even more opportunity to Embrace the Possibility that we can welcome more young people into leadership roles as the year rambles on.

Thanks so much to Suzanne Christ, Diane Bofinger, and Marge Marcille as our Committee on Mission for using the Circle Way to help the FD team define goals that will enhance our entire community even in the midst of constant Change.

CARING FOR ONE ANOTHER RECIPES

Christine Boczarska and Faith Pham are sisters and dedicated members of our Caring For One Another group. They provide occasional meals to church members on an as-needed basis. With the meal they generally include a "goodie bag" and a card on behalf of the Caring Group. They often submit healthy recipes for the monthly *Foreword*. The recipes are easy and usually use fresh vegetables.

Vegetarian/Vegan Potato Salad

This is a recipe for a tasty potato salad that meets vegan requirements.

2 lbs mini potatoes, any variety

1/4 cup olive oil

1/4 cup vinegar, any variety

Salt and pepper to taste

1/4 cup chopped celery

Any added vegetables such as shredded carrots,

chopped green onion, fresh peas, parsley etc. to your taste

1/2 tsp dry mustard

2 hard boiled eggs (optional)

1 Tbsp sweet or dill relish (optional)



Boil potatoes until done but firm. Keep skins on and slice in half to make bite-sized pieces. Chill.

Mix oil, vinegar and dry mustard and pour over chilled potatoes, celery and vegetables, mixing to blend.

Mix in relish, if using, salt and pepper to taste. Chill until ready to serve.

Vegetarians may wish to add boiled egg chunks or slices.

This is a refreshing summer potato salad that will not spoil or get runny in your picnic basket.

BECOME A CHALICE LIGHTER

Becoming a Chalice Lighter is a way for UU church members to help fund the kind of grants that UU Amherst will be receiving to upgrade our technology. As a Chalice Lighter, you receive three calls a year. Any amount is welcome; \$20 per call is recommended. Helping neighboring congregations to realize their dream is a splendid way to cooperatively grow the faith. When you signup, you are joining with other churches that are part of the Central East Region (CER) to which we belong. ENDOWMENT TRUST

Because the Endowment Trust is a separate entity from the church, the Trustees have specific **fiduciary responsibilities**, meaning we are bound ethically to act in the church's best interests. The Second Amended Declaration of Trust is a legal document that specifies how the Trust will be managed. We are in the process of printing that brochure with changes approved by the congregation at the past two annual meetings, and it will be available soon next to the Endowment Tree (which acknowledges donation milestones) in the church Atrium.

At **quarterly meetings**, your Endowment Trustees and a liaison from our church Board of Trustees consult with a **Certified Financial Planner**, **Michael Angelucci** of Level Financial Advisors, who was hired as professional advisor in 2013. (As a CFP, Mike is also duty-bound to act in each client's best fiduciary interests). Level uses Charles Schwab & Co., Inc. as custodian of our portfolio.

Your elected **TRUSTEES** serve five-year terms. The Trustees are **Joe Rautenstrauch**, who serves as Treasurer (term expiring in June 2023); **Elaine Cusker**, Recording Secretary (-2024); and **Lauraine Marcus**, Corresponding Secretary (-2025). Our fifth Trustee was elected at the 2021 annual meeting and serves at-Large--**John Thompson**'s term runs through 2026.

Emily Garrett will be our Board liaison for 2021-2022.
