

It's our second winter holiday season under Covid restrictions and we are exercising the creativity centers in our brains to offer safe and meaningful opportunities to gather in person and virtually. BOARD REPORT

Dear Friends,

Happy Gratitude day! I want to take this opportunity to thank our staff, board and the many volunteers that make UU Amherst the beloved community it is. We are blessed.

UU Amherst has been very fortunate to receive the Chalice Lighter's Grant for \$20,000 to update our technology and expand our hybrid programs. Our team is working hard to bring professional hybrid services to us and the larger community. Les Buhite and Andy Andersen have been the driving forces behind this. The next step will be improved lighting and upgrading the screens in the sanctuary.



We are in the process of implementing the next phase of our technology plan. Joce Kofke is the lead on this phase. Joce is currently setting up a member, who is in a long-term care facility, with an i-pad and is tutoring this senior on how to use it and how to access church programs. We will be purchasing four i-pads with an account for internet access. If you know of anyone who is currently disconnected from the church services because of technology, please let Elaine Harrigan, Joce Kofke or myself know. The way this will work is the person will be loaned the equipment and tutored on the how to's. Then they can choose to purchase one and have it set up and then the next person who would like the same level of tech support will be given the same opportunity and support.

The facilities focus group will be having a meeting with Jen Hill and the architects from Wendel. After this meeting, the team will be reaching out to the congregation for guidance. There is much to be excited about!

The Finance Committee has been working hard. They are exploring and interviewing financial advisors (brokerages) to create a smooth method for our members to donate stock or money from their mandatory retirement distributions directly without paying taxes on the sale of stock or a distribution from an IRA. Of course, one should always consult their own financial advisor on the mechanics of this. The Committee has recommended to the Board going back to the Calendar year versus the July 1-June 30th church year. Stayed tuned as we will need to do a congregational vote on this at the annual meeting. They have also recommended creating a capital reserve fund for building repair and projects. Honestly, we should have done this long ago. The recommendation is to put 5% of our annual budget in the reserve. By doing this and hiring a brokerage to handle our account, we can invest and get a higher return than a savings account. The Committee has also recommended increasing rents across the board by 10%. We need good financial planning in order to do what is needed to create the church buildings to be efficient, green and accessible to all.

The three Foci are still in process. Admittedly it is taking longer than we had anticipated. Rest assured that donations can only be spent on these projects. As mentioned in the last newsletter, the sign project has been delayed due to logistics regarding the electric source. Additionally, it was discovered in the facilities review that our electric service is insufficient for the demands we put on it. The costs may be absorbed in the long-term facilities project. There also needs to be meetings with the town and permits to acquire. The facilities portion has begun with an in-depth study of our physical plant and mechanics. Currently we have invested \$30,000+ in this necessary work. Along with that, we have spent \$5,500 to repair and construct proper drainage near the daycare. The green team saw the goats come and clear an area in the ecology center. The festival has been postponed because of COVID.

Erie County has the highest infection rate in New York State **at 8%.** Friends, we have a wonderful medical team that is guiding us. That increase keeps us at bay. As soon as the medical team gives us the go ahead, the coffee will flow and friends will come together. Until then, we must be responsible for the well-being of our members and friends. Your board wants to bring us all together, too.

Remember that the first Tuesday of the month at 7:00 is talk back Tuesday with the board. This is your opportunity to have coffee and have an informal chat with board members and friends. The link always comes in an all-church email. Please join us in talking about our church, joys and sorrows and your dreams and aspirations for the future.

A few board members attended a three-month training on being a church board. It was clear to me that we are being proactive and are in "better shape" than many of our sister congregations. Thank you for supporting the church and staying connected. We are doing well in spite of current restrictions. Your patience will make it better for all of us.

This edition is the December newsletter. We are still working on the Christmas season events. Much will depend on the medical team and news from the Erie County Health Department. Rev. Michelle will be keeping us informed as the holidays get closer.

As we enter this time of gratitude and celebration, I wish you the warmth of loving family and friends, creating new memories that bring you joy and most of all a peaceful heart during these turbulent times. Happy holidays!

FAITH DEVELOPMENT

Dear UU Amherst members and friends,

What does it mean to be a community that opens to Joy? This familiar doxology may inform us:

From all that dwells below the skies, Let faith and hope and joy arise, Let beauty, truth, and good be sung, Through every land by every tongue.

The tune comes from the 16th Century Genevan Psalter created under the supervision of John Calvin. Even though I find it ironic that someone who preached fire and brimstone and individual salvation would espouse the



communal singing of the Psalms, I can appreciate that the hymn's origin came from the practice of singing Psalm 100 in the Calvanist tradition. As "The Old One Hundredth" it has gone through many iterations within Unitarian Universalism, and appears in our hymnal "Singing the Living Tradition" as Nos. 370 to 381.

Every single week that we meet in our Sanctuary for Sunday services, I miss our joyful communal singing more and more. We are a people who center the safety of our fellow congregants and newcomers of all ages, and to refrain from singing is a sacrifice we make. My friends, I intensely miss the Joy of singing in the moment as we gather in beloved community. In person. In our Sanctuary.

In the version of the Old One Hundredth that we are most familiar with, Joy is part of a trinity; it is included with Faith and Hope. Joy seems the most fleeting and elusive of the three legs of this stool. As if without the strongholds of Faith and Hope, it couldn't stand, it wouldn't be able to emerge. Isn't Joy momentary? Is it over when we finish the song, or when we can't sing? Maybe, but Faith and Hope tell us that it will come back around.

Right now, in this moment, on the page where my words have the potential to reach the greatest number of people in this beloved community, I would like to affirm that Joy will always come back around if we make room for it with our Faith and Hope. Right now, this might be very difficult for you to affirm, as we move into a holiday season filled with sustained uncertainty. We're just on Thanksgiving. What will the end of December bring? How do we usher in Joy at the outset of the upcoming New Year?

We usher in Joy by holding on to the Faith and Hope that what we have learned in this immediate past is capable of helping us sustain our relationships, even if we can't sing or be together in person. May all the possible moments of Joy come to you and yours these upcoming Holy Days.

NEW CLOTHING MINISTRY

There is a new ministry at the UUCA! We are still working on a catchy name but we are already well established in the pantry area.

When Covid19 brought everything to a halt last year (including the rummage sale), a group of rummage people realized that we already had a basement full of items, especially clothing. In an effort to help clean up the basement and find a new home for these donations, the BOT was contacted and it was arranged that a clothing rack would be placed near the food pantry and clothing offered to the community. This was very low

CARING FOR ONE ANOTHER RECIPES

Christine Boczarska and Faith Pham are sisters and dedicated members of our Caring For One Another group. They provide occasional meals to church members on an as-needed basis. With the meal they generally include a "goodie bag" and a card on behalf of the Caring Group. They often submit healthy recipes for the monthly *Foreward*. The recipes are easy and usually use fresh vegetables.

Did someone say turkey? This is a vegetarian recipe from Turkey not made with turkey. To make sure these pancakes come out crispy you must squeeze all the water out of the zucchini before mixing it with the other ingredients. From Elaine Louie in *The New York Times*.

Zucchini Pancakes

30 minutes Makes about 12 pancakes

3 medium zucchini (about 1 pound) shredded Salt

Freshly ground pepper

3 large eggs, beaten

1/2 cup all purpose flour

1 Tbsp olive oil

1 cup crumbled feta cheese

3 scallions, finely chopped

1/3 cup finely chopped dill

1 tsp baking powder

4 to 6 Tbsp vegetable oil or more as needed

For the yogurt sauce 2/3 cup plain yogurt 2 cloves garlic finely chopped



Preheat oven to 250 degrees. Place zucchini in a colander over a bowl and mix with 1/2 teaspoon salt. Allow to drain for 5 minutes. Transfer to a cloth kitchen towel and squeeze hard to extract as much liquid as possible. Squeeze a second time. Volume will shrink to about half the original amount.

In a large mixing bowl combine zucchini and eggs. Using a fork, mix well. Add flour, 1/2 tsp salt, olive oil, feta, scallions, dill and black pepper. Mix well, add baking powder and mix again.

Place a cast iron skillet or other heavy skillet over medium heat. Add 2 tablespoons vegetable oil and heat until shimmering. Place heaping tablespoons of zucchini batter in pan, allowing room to spread. Flatten them with a spatula if needed. Pancakes should be about 3/8 inch thick and 3 inches in diameter. Fry until golden on one side, turn and fry until golden on the other side. Repeat once or twice, frying about 5 to 6 minutes so pancakes get quite crisp. Transfer to a plate lined with paper towels and keep warm in the oven. Continue frying remaining batter, adding more oil as needed. Serve hot.



ENDOWMENT TRUST

When the Endowment Trustees met on October 19, we voted unanimously to return our **Investment Strategy** to a **60/40** mix of stocks and bonds, respectively. We had changed to a 50/50 proportion in August of 2019, expecting the church Board's assessment of UU Amherst's facilities to result in imminent expenditures. Several of us have served on the Facilities Task Force and/or focus group, and it seems that funds will need to be distributed on a more long-term basis. The larger proportion of stocks is expected to yield more income to our portfolio, while still being diversified and somewhat protected from market volatility.

We also instructed our financial advisor to **reinvest dividends** in the funds that pay them, rather than collecting that money in a separate account. This should also maximize growth of our portfolio's value, because stocks tend to gain value at a rate higher than a money market savings account's interest. The Treasurer and I will still be able to access the value of dividends to track Endowment's annual income.

Since its inception in 1989, Endowment **income** (earnings from dividends and interest) was occasionally tapped for **unanticipated projects/capital expenditures** that went beyond the church operating budget. A **specific amount** of money is requested by the church Board of Trustees for a **clearly defined purpose**, then voted on by the Endowment Trustees. The Endowment Trustees determine if disbursement requests are reasonable and have the final decision about whether or not to release funds representing <u>income</u>. If would dip into the portfolio's <u>principal</u>, the congregation would also have to vote in favor.

Though all investments took a value hit at the start of the COVID-19 pandemic, the stock market rebounded quickly despite other economic struggles. UUCA Endowment was established with a goal of reaching one million dollars in assets, at which time the earnings could be disbursed to help fund regular church operations. In November 2020, we achieved that goal! We will work with the church Board of Trustees to determine how income dollars will be disbursed, as we continue to protect the principal that generates those earnings.

SPOTLIGHT ON THE COMMITTEE ON MISSION

When UU Amherst made the transition to policy governance in 2018, the elements of church life were divided into two "pies," Governance and Ministry. This month we are highlighting the Committee on Mission, sometimes known as the Committee on Shared Ministry. The function of the CoM is to work with committees and ministry teams to articulate that group's purpose in light of the church's stated mission. As this is a fairly new committee, they have been meeting with ministry teams and offering the Circle Way process so that all voices can be heard and clearly stated measurable goals can be established. All of this is in an effort to strengthen and align the various ministries, which fosters more collaboration and unity of purpose within the congregation. The current members of the CoM are Suzanne Christ, Diane Bofinger, Marge Marcille, and Board representative, Jeanine Moyer.
