

BOARD REPORT

Hi, Everyone!

It's hard to believe that spring is around the corner... have faith! It's coming! In essence the church year closes at the end of June, time is both dragging and flying! There is so much that is in flux:

- 1. Having people step up to be nominated for the Board of Trustees:
 Folks, we need you! Don Tucker, Laurie Kasnicki and I come off the board this year. Although we would like to finish some of the amazing projects that were started on our watch, the By Laws don't allow for it. To date, the nominating committee has not had one person say yes to stepping up to this level of leadership. We need three (3). If you have thought about being an integral part of church leadership at a time when exciting things are unfolding, please consider stepping up. If you need more information, ask any board member.
- 2. We thought the sign would be the easiest of our projects. It turns out, we have some challenges that were unknown when we began. The sign team is moving forward and we will have a vote on expenditure of money for the project in annual meeting (stay tuned). Some of the challenges are tree and rock removal, electricity to the location, variances with the town, trenching through bed rock, etc. It isn't just a simple project (as I thought it would be).
- 3. Next would be sign presentations to the congregation.
- 4. Although we are voting on the change back to the calendar year, we still have a gratitude drive to implement. We will be preparing a six (6) month budget and then follow up with a year budget after the annual meeting. There are many advantages to the calendar year. We have presented a deficit budget the last two years. It is imperative that we become more financially stable. Now is the time to increase your pledge. We have lost members over the last two years which greatly impact our financial stability. Without grants and the PPP (payroll Protection Program) loan program. We would have been in the red again. Although we are not a "business," we cannot survive by creating deficits each year.
- 5. The gratitude drive needs you. Please contact Karen Thompson if you are willing to: make calls, write thank you notes, stuff envelopes or do something I haven't thought of. We need people. Many hands make light work for each. Chatting with friends should be an easy reach. I appreciate whatever help you are willing to give.
- 6. Next up would be the facilities presentation to the congregation regarding the architects' findings and suggestions. A capital campaign would need to follow.
- 7. Timing of our full reopening. We are letting the medical team lead on this. They are in the trenches and know our church community. Safety is our primary concern.
- 8. The tech team has moved forward with what we need to be adept at hybrid and online services.
- 9. The Green Justice Team and FD are creating new projects to help feed our pantry clients fresh produce over the summer months. They are busily planning the Living Green festival.

For tax purposes, we highly recommend keeping your own records of share-the-plate and Endowment Trust contributions.

ENDOWMENT TRUST

At our January 18, 2022, meeting, your Endowment Trustees voted to move ALL of our investments (both stocks and bonds) into ESG's, sometimes called "ethically responsible investments." ESG stands for Environmental, Social, and Governance. This means that fund managers screen out companies that have questionable environmental policies or labor practices, or produce products such as tobacco or guns. Most are also ETF's (Exchange-Traded Funds, which are most cost-effective than traditional mutual funds.) EFT's have lower transaction and broker fees when holdings are bought or sold. We hold a limited number of funds, but frequently buy more shares as we receive donations.

For a number of years, we have held one fund that was considered socially responsible, and it accounted for 5% of our overall portfolio. We will be moving our stock holdings from that Parnassus Core Equity fund to Vanguard ESG US Stock ETF. Parnassus has generally out-performed the S&P 500, and Vanguard has done even better, with total growth of 77.96% (compared to 74.71% and 66.47% for Parnsassus and S&P, respectively). Vanguard also has more diversified holdings, attempting to emulate the total stock market while maintaining ethical parameters. The screening process is done by a third-party vendor to eliminate bias.

We thank our Certified Financial Planner, Mike Angelucci, for investigating three different ESG stock fund options and creating charts and graphs to help us compare them to each other and the market at large. He is also guiding us with review of our fiduciary responsibilities to make sure the Trustees are operating in UU Amherst's best interest.

CARING FOR ONE ANOTHER RECIPES

Christine Boczarska and Faith Pham are sisters and dedicated members of our Caring For One Another group. They provide occasional meals to church members on an as-needed basis. With the meal they generally include a "goodie bag" and a card on behalf of the Caring Group. Each month you'll find one of their healthy recipes here in *The Foreword* often incorporating fresh vegetables and even gluten-free.

This is a flavorful fish recipe from David Kinch in The Week.

Salmon en papillote

2 tsp salt packed capers
8 button mushrooms
1 fennel bulb, trimmed, thinly sliced
1 pint cherry tomatoes, halved
12 green olives thinly sliced
1 1/2 lbs salmon, skin removed,
cut into four portions

2 Tbsp extra virgin olive oil 4 Tbsp dry white wine a handful of basil leaves 1 lemon, thinly sliced salt and freshly ground pepper Chopped fresh flat leaf parsley for garnish



Preheat oven to 400 degrees

Rinse capers in cold water, place in a bowl, cover with cold water for 10 minutes, to remove salt. Drain and set aside. Brush off any dirt on mushrooms, remove and discard stems and thinly slice caps.

Divide vegetables into four portions. Cut four sheets of parchment paper a bit more than double the size of one fish portion and fold each sheet in half. Unfold one sheet and lay two slices of fennel on one half of the paper as the base. Layer mushrooms on the fennel and lay a piece of fish on top. Sprinkle on capers, tomatoes and olives. Douse with 1/2 Tbsp olive oil and 1 Tbsp white wine. Top with basil leaves, lemon slices a healthy pinch each of salt and pepper.

Refold parchment paper to cover fish, fold edge of parchment up in shallow triangles, working your way around until the packet is sealed on all sides. Fold final triangle down to force the pillow you've created to lie flat. Repeat with the other three pieces of fish.

Place packets on a large baking sheet and bake 14 minutes. Remove from oven.

With scissors carefully open each packet. Discard lemon slices and push each fish portion and its accoutrements onto a plate, sliding the paper out from beneath. Garnish with parsley and serve. Serves 4.

The recipe has all the wonderful Mediterranean flavors and it is quick to cook.

What is a Sabbatical?

You may be familiar with the term sabbatical leave as a semester or year free from teaching responsibilities that can be devoted to research, professional development, and writing. Traditionally, faculty members must have completed seven years of service at an institution prior to receiving a sabbatical. Sabbaticals are increasingly being included as part of minister's compensations packages.

As per Rev. Michelle's contract, her sabbatical leave has been accruing at the rate of one month per year of service. She is eligible for and the board approved a sabbatical from May through August this year. She will use this time for study, education, writing, meditation, and other forms of professional and religious growth. We have been preparing for this time by annually sequestering funds for use in funding any additional expenses during the Rev. Michelle's sabbatical. Why a Sabbatical

During the months of May, June, July and August, Rev. Michelle will be totally disengaging from her ministerial role. She has been serving us as developmental and then settled minister for 7 years. We have both expended great amounts of energy and emotion on behalf of our beloved community as we have transitioned from where we were to who we are now. This has been complicated by personal losses as well as COVID. And now we are on the cusp of defining our actions for the future. Rev. Michelle (and the congregation) needs a pause to rebalance – thus the Sabbatical (while this may be the first our church has experienced, this is a normal practice in other congregations and denominations). A sabbatical is NOT a vacation it is an opportunity for:

Reflection- Rev. Michelle will be taking time away from the responsibilities of the church as she studies, writes, and learns new skills which she will then bring back and use to enhance the overall church experience

Renewal- Creativity flows when synchronicity of the body, mind and spirit are in balance.

Recharging/ Reconnecting- Balance happens best when one is connected to that which gives ultimate meaning and purpose to life.

Restoration- As Rev. Michelle "recharges her battery" she will also restore a sense of healthy balance which will, in turn flow into the life of the congregation.

Rejuvenation/ Revitalization- Lowering stress levels offer opportunity to increase one's overall well-being and make space for change of perspective, growth, new stories and new skills.

Reclaiming- The health of UU Amherst depends on our ability to take more ownership for decision making and the ministry of the church.

Responsibility – While Rev. Michelle is away the congregation needs to come together and take on leadership. The congregational benefits of a sabbatical can be opportunities for growth and overall learning experiences for everyone. This can be a time of discernment for decisions regarding the physical plant, programming, outreach and mission of the church as we grow forward.

The positives of Sabbatical remain long after the 4 months and will help the church blossom in new ways...beyond what we can image especially when we work together to cultivate love and leadership.
