

BOARD REPORT

Hi, Everyone!

It is so hard to believe that the church program year is coming to a close just when we are getting closer to fully re-opening. It was so wonderful to see people together having coffee in the Emerson Room the last two weeks! In the days and weeks ahead, there are many changes in the wind. Rev. Michelle will be on sabbatical from May 1 thru August 31st. Thank you to the Sabbatical team for helping to make this time run more smoothly.



Annual Meeting. NYS law prevents us, as a religious institution, from having a hybrid annual meeting. To make sure that we are all inclusive, we are having a 100% virtual (on-line) Annual Meeting. If you are aware of people who do not have computer or phone access to the internet, please invite them to watch with you. If you are someone who cannot find someone to watch with, please let me (Karen Thompson) know and I will try and assist you. The Annual Meeting will be at noon on June 12th. The link will follow as we get closer.



We are going to have a pre-meeting on the Sunday before, June 5th, to answer questions, inform you of what areas will need to be voted on and we will follow up with a picnic to celebrate coming through the pandemic and being together as a community once again. We are working on the details, so stay tuned!

The Generosity drive still continues. Looking at the big picture without the fund raising and rentals, we have tapped into our reserves. We had presented a deficit budget the last two years. There will be no payroll protection program grants to help ease the financial struggles. We are asking people to give 60% of last years' year-long pledge for the six-month budget period with a second pledge drive in the fall for the following year. With escalating costs and no other income, we are in deficit again. This pattern is not sustainable. Please consider increasing your pledge

Some good news. We will be voting on the expenditure for the sign and the project will hopefully be moving forward more rapidly. Even though the money was raised for these specific projects, the congregation needs to vote on the expenditure according to the bylaws. The funds donated were designated for these projects and cannot be used any other way. The Living Green Festival for the fall is being planned and the Green Justice Team is working diligently to bring in great speakers, a basket raffle, the goats and much more.

Coffee hour needs volunteers. The bottom line is, if we want coffee etc. we need to have people to make it and clean up. There will be no snacks until the medical team allows it. Snacks may be served at Memorial Services. That said, coffee hour should be much simpler so do volunteer. It is a great way to work together and get to know new friends. Also, Elaine Cusker, John and I have donated coffee urns and cold drink dispensers.



Endowment received an unexpected, unrestricted use grant of \$4,783.03 in April through the generosity of the **Evelyn T. Watson Fund for the Promotion and Advancement of "Historical Phases of Prophetic Teaching" at the Community Foundation for Greater Buffalo.** THANK YOU to the advisor to the fund who recommended this grant, **Virginia M. Our Endowment continues to perform well in this volatile financial market. The value of our investments has fallen some after a peak of \$1,198,588.02 last April. As of March 31 (end of the first quarter of 2022), our investments are worth \$1,090,701.75 and we have \$11,925.87 in cash deposits (Schwab money market and Citizens Bank checking).

CARING FOR ONE ANOTHER RECIPES Provided by Christine Boczarska and Faith Pham

Christine Boczarska and Faith Pham are sisters and dedicated members of our Caring For One Another group. They provide occasional meals to church members on an as-needed basis. With the meal they generally include a "goodie bag" and a card on behalf of the Caring Group. Each month you'll find one of their healthy recipes here in *The Foreword* often incorporating fresh vegetables and even gluten-free.

Grilled Chicken Breast

1 Chicken breast sliced in half lengthwise Salt Pepper Olive oil or spray

Pound the two slices of chicken to an even thickness with a mallet or rolling pin (covering with waxed paper makes it tidier). Season with salt and pepper. Spray a pan or add one tablespoon of olive oil and heat on medium high heat. Add the flattened chicken and brown on both sides. This takes about 3 to 4 minutes. Do not overcook.

Asparagus with Cashews

1 lb asparagus washed and bottoms trimmed 1/2 cup toasted, unsalted cashews 2 Tbsp cornstarch 1 cup vegetable broth 1/4 cup sherry or white wine

Place asparagus in a microwave safe dish and set aside.

Toast cashews until lightly brown and sprinkle over asparagus.

In a saucepan add the cornstarch to the vegetable broth and stir until dissolved. Cook this over medium heat until thickened and then stir in the sherry. Pour over the asparagus and cashews and microwave to your preference of doneness. We usually cook on high for five minutes.



COVID CORNER

Covid fatigue has infiltrated New York State! I just read that there are 2 new Omicron variants based on the BA2 variety that are widely infecting the Finger Lakes area. Did you know that the only mask found to be effective against these new varieties is the KN95 or N95 type? Masks of any sort are no longer required inside unless you are on public transport. I, for one, am pleased the public transport requirement is still in effect as I am taking a 9 hour train ride next week and then I need to present a negative Covid

test to embark on my cruise. I intend to wear my KN95 mask whenever I enter a building or am in close contact with anyone outside my bubble. Is this overkill? Not for me, but it may be for you. UU Amherst no longer mandates masks inside although they are recommended. There will be coffee, but no snacks during coffee hour after service. Social distance will no longer be enforced in the buildings. If you feel the need to mask up and social distance, we will not prevent you from doing so. Our new normal is a fluid response to our public health situation. If you are not vaccinated and you haven't gotten a booster (or two), I highly recommend that you do. It is the best thing you can do to keep yourself out of the hospital ICU when Covid comes knocking at your door. We have come a long way in the past 2 years. Enjoy the warmer weather and hope to see you at church.
