

A REPORT FROM YOUR SABBATICAL TEAM

Dear Friends.

We have reached the midpoint of our Sabbatical. Thank you to all of you who have respected Rev. Michelle's Sabbatical and have not contacted her.

This is a good time to review what a sabbatical is. A sabbatical is NOT a vacation, it is an opportunity for:

Reflection- Rev. Michelle studies, writes, and learns new skills which she will then bring back and use to enhance the overall church experience.

Renewal- Creativity flows when synchronicity of the body, mind and spirit are in balance.

Recharging/ Reconnecting- Balance happens best when one is connected to that which gives ultimate meaning and purpose to life.

Restoration- As Rev. Michelle "recharges her battery" she will also restore a sense of healthy balance which will, in turn flow into the life of the congregation.

Rejuvenation/ Revitalization- Lowering stress levels offers opportunities to increase one's overall well-being and make space for change of perspective, growth, new stories and new skills.

Reclaiming- The health of UU Amherst depends on our ability to take more ownership for decision making and the ministry of the church.

Responsibility – The congregation comes together and takes on leadership. The congregational benefits of a sabbatical can be opportunities for growth and overall learning experiences for everyone. This can be a time of discernment for decisions regarding the physical plant, programming, outreach and mission of the church as we grow forward.

The positives of Sabbatical remain long after the 4 months and will help the church blossom in new ways... beyond what we imagine especially when we work together to cultivate love and leadership.

The Sabbatical Team's worship responsibilities are visible every Sunday. Pastoral care is available on an as needed basis by Rev. Lisa Peterangelo. Rev. Lisa has been working with Cindy Baumgartner to plan Ralph's memorial service on Wednesday, July 13th.

BOARD REPORT

A sincere thank you all who participated in the 2022 Congregational Annual Meeting held on Sunday, June 12th. While meeting in person would certainly have been preferable, holding the gathering fully remote generally worked well. Hopefully, revisions to the state Religious Corporations laws (we must follow these rules when conducting business meetings) will be amended soon allowing future congregational meetings to be dual platform with both in-person and remote participation possible.

The congregation unanimously elected Bob Johnson, Randy Kent and Tom Langan to the Board of Trustees; Marjorie Buscher, Marlana Rice and Jackie Senders to the Nominating & Leadership Development Committee, and Dorothy Reade to the Endowment Trust. Congratulations to all!

On behalf of the my fellow Trustees and the entire congregation, I want to sincerely thank Laurie Kasnicki, Karen Thompson and Don Tucker for their service as their Board terms come to an end. In particular, we should all be grateful for Karen's dedicated and tireless efforts as Chair of the Board over the past two years. Thank you Karen for everything you have done in support of our beloved community.

Bob, Randy and Tom will be joining Linda Gardner, Jeanine Moyer and I on the Board. Unfortunately Emily Garrett has decided to step back from her Board position. We thank Emily for her valuable service on the Board - you'll be missed! The new Board will have the opportunity to appoint a replacement to complete Emily's unexpired term.

The congregation also overwhelming approved moving forward with the installation of the new digital sign for the church. The vote to authorize an expenditure not to exceed \$76,000 for the new sign allows for the final design to be concluded, vendor contracts awarded, necessary town approvals and permitting obtained, and the required ancillary infrastructure improvements completed to proceed as quickly as possible, all in advance of the actual sign Installation. Given the current challenges facing the construction industry, it is unclear how long this entire process will take, but we will keep you informed. As a Reminder, the new sign is being fully funded by generous member donations and with the financial support of the Endowment Trust!



NOTE: Color scheme & street number placement have not been finalized.


The congregational vote to revise the By-Laws to reflect a change in the church's operating and budget year to a January – December calendar year basis failed to attain the required 75% affirmative approval margin. Accordingly, the proposed interim six-month July 1 – December 31, 2022 operating budget (and UUA contribution) was not able to be considered during the meeting. The new Board, in collaboration with the Finance Committee, will be reviewing all of the available alternatives (which could include an e-vote on the proposed By-Law revisions). A special congregational meeting will be required no matter what course is determined; stay-tuned for more information.

The new Board will have met by the time you are reading this in order to elect its officers for the upcoming period and to set its near-term action priorities. Check the Weekly Update of June 24th to learn who has been elected to serve as Board Chairperson; Vice-Chairperson and Secretary.

Significant opportunities & challenges face the congregation and the new Board will strive to provide effective leadership while working collaboratively with all segments of our church to balance both the realities of the immediate pressing financial concerns and our mutual desire to grow our membership, improve our facilities, and expand our outreach, connection and support to the broader community, all while living the seven UU principles of our cherished liberal religion.

Marie Evans, outgoing trustee and chair of the Endowment, wrote an extensive review of the Trust's activities over the course of the past 12 months in the Church Annual Report. To get a sense of the Church/Trust interdependence, please read that report. Marie has served 5 years as an Endowment Trustee and more recently as its chair. She will be missed. At the same time, the Endowment looks forward to Dorothy Reade joining its membership, having been elected to a 5-year term at the Annual Meeting.

The Trust is aware of the current volatility of the financial markets in which we have our investments. We are maintaining a 60/40 stock/bond ratio. CARING FOR ONE ANOTHER RECIPES

Christine Boczarska and Faith Pham are sisters and dedicated members of our Caring For One Another group. They provide occasional meals to church members on an as-needed basis. With the meal they generally include a "goodie bag" and a card on behalf of the Caring Group. This is a quick, refreshing meal that is heavy on veggies and delicious.

Vietnamese Lettuce Wraps

Pork roast, or any meat, cold and thinly sliced Bibb lettuce leaves or a similar type, washed and dried Carrot sticks, thinly sliced Cucumber sticks, thinly sliced Scallions, thinly sliced lengthwise Sprouts

Cilantro or parsley if you prefer

Cellophane noodles, cooked and cold. Available in the Asian food section in the supermarket.

Hoisin sauce

Serve each ingredient on a separate plate. To assemble, take a lettuce leaf and in it place some of the above ingredients, to your taste. Drizzle on hoisin sauce, wrap the lettuce leaf in a roll, tuck in one end, and eat by hand. Delicious with beer. Prosecco or seltzer water accompaniment.

To make this vegetarian, substitute seitan, fried portobello mushroom strips or crisply fried tofu for the meat.

"The Rule of International Law and the U.N.'s Agenda 2030"

The rule of international law is the foundation of the United Nations. On the international level, it is fundamental to international peace and security. All 193 United Nations Member States have an obligation to abide by the United Nations Charter and the wider body of international law. All 193 United Nations Member States are expected to abide by these laws and work to ensure that seeking world peace is the essence of the United Nations work to promote the rule of international law at the international level.

On 24 September 2012, the United Nations General Assembly adopted a Declaration emphasizing the importance of the rule of international law. The United Nations provides rule of international law assistance to over 150 United Nations Member States. The United Nations has also developed a large body of universally agreed upon norms and standards. The Declaration builds upon the fundamental formula of the 2005 United Nations World Summit. There is no peace without development; there is no development without peace; and there is no lasting peace and sustainable development without respect for human rights. The United Nations' challenge now is to implement this Declaration. Promoting the rule of international law is, therefore, an extremely important task for the United Nations. Coordinating this process is very difficult, given the large number of United Nations Member States and their usual intransigence. United Nations Secretary-General António Guterres is attempting to promote this process of coordination.

The challenge for the United Nations, therefore, will be to encourage all 193 United Nations Member States to implement the United Nations Agenda 2030 and the U.N.'s Sustainable Development Goals (SOGs). The U.N. Agenda 2030 and the United Nations Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs). The United Nations Agenda 2020 is devoted to enhancing the rule o international law and encourages all 193 United Nations Member States to abide by it. At the present time, most U.N. Member States abide by the rule of international law and the U.N. Charter only when it is compatible with their foreign policy objectives. That is why the United Nations is unfortunately of less importance that it ought to be.

The time to implement the U.N.'s agenda 2030 is now. This will help the international community give the rule of international law the central role it deserves in world affairs. The international community must develop new approaches to implement the rule of international law. The United Nations should help all 193 United Nations Member States to strengthen the rule of international law and ensure that abiding by the rule of international law promotes world peace, international security, and human rights—the primary purpose of the United Nations and its Charter.

This is not an easy or simple task, but it needs to be accomplished if the human family is to endure and have a bright future. There is no time to lose: the United Nations must be made to work now and only intelligent human beings can make this happen.
