BOARD REPORT

If you were in Church Sunday, December 11th, you probably noticed National Fuel trucks out front and their people digging up our front lawn. They were looking for the gas line, not to repair it, but to mark it so that the electrical contractor for the sign could begin work and, in fact, the contractor has begun their work. While the weather does affect their progress, the process is moving forward, and we can anticipate the long awaited new sign will become a reality in 2023.



The 2023 pledge drive letters have gone out and the volunteers will begin to contact you about your pledge. We realize it's the holiday season and there may be a pause in their efforts. We hope to have the pledges all made by mid-January so the Finance Committee, the Minister, and the BOT can work on a budget for 2023. That budget will be presented to the congregation at our annual meeting Sunday, February 26th. Due to a change in NYS Law, we can now hold a hybrid meeting both in person and on-line.

We look forward to a successful year in 2023. We have a new sign on the way; we again have in-church events like the recent spaghetti dinner with more events to come; and we have other ideas that you will hear about in the coming year as we prepare for our 70th anniversary in 2024.

ENDOWMENT TRUST

The Endowment Trust's next quarterly meeting is scheduled for January, 17 2023, at 6:00 pm in the Emerson Room. Church members are welcome to attend (please contact a Trustee in advance if you have a specific topic/question).

The value of our portfolio continues to be buffeted by the current economic uncertainties. As of November 30th, total value of the Endowment Trust accounts (Schwab account and checking account) was \$1,017,129.20. By the time you read this, the Endowment will have most likely have completed its funding commitment towards the new church sign, bringing the value below one million again.

Please remember, you can help the Endowment grow by remembering friends and loved ones by making a donation in their name. The family of the person being remembered receives a letter from the Endowment Trust Board saying that Trust received a gift in the name of the deceased person. You receive a letter from the ET Board thanking you for your gift. This can be used as documentation for tax purposes. Consider adding the Endowment in your will either by a designated amount or percentage of your estate. If you have questions about this, an Endowment Trustee would be pleased to talk to you.

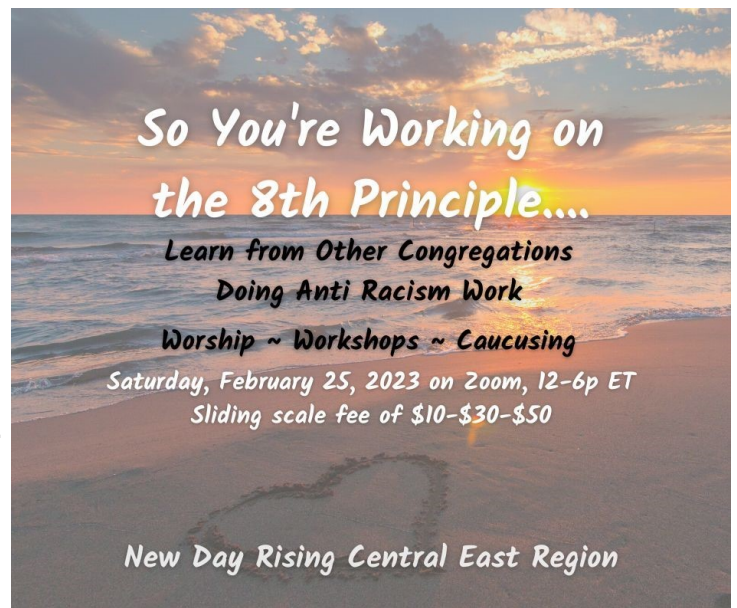
We are always looking for volunteers, as well. Thank you to all of our Pantry Team members that work so hard to keep our Pantry Open 24/7 for those in need.

Ministry Council

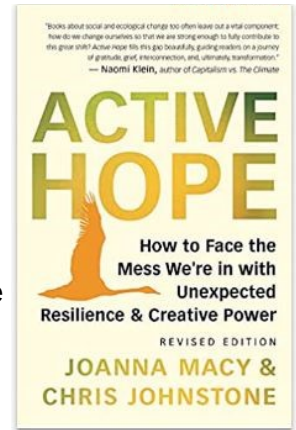
After a very productive experiment of meeting for an extended length of time as well as opening the meeting beyond team leaders, the Ministry Council has decided to continue the experiment!

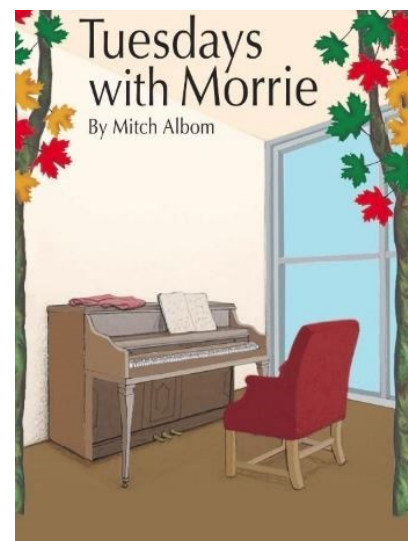
THEATER LOVERS

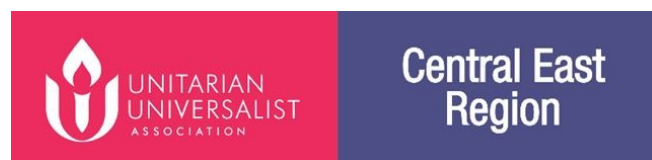

CARING FOR ONE ANOTHER RECIPES Provided by Christine Boczarska and Faith Pham

Christine Boczarska and Faith Pham are sisters and dedicated members of our Caring For One Another group. They provide occasional meals to church members on an as-needed basis. With the meal they generally include a “goodie bag” and a card on behalf of the Caring Group. Each month you’ll find one of their healthy recipes here in *The Foreword* often incorporating fresh vegetables and even gluten-free.

Some very quick holiday sweet treats that you can put together in about an hour total and are always a hit.

Caramel Candy Treats

- 1 package of Rolo chocolate caramels
- 1 package of pecan halves, toasted
- 1 package of small pretzels

Set the oven at 350 degrees. Toast the pecan halves using an equal amount to the number of Rolo candies.

On each small pretzel place one Rolo and top it with a toasted pecan. Place these on a parchment paper lined baking pan and put in the oven until the Rolo is soft but not collapsed. Take out immediately and press down the pecan onto the soft Rolo and let cool. Store as you would cookies.

Note: If you prefer a peanut butter flavor, substitute small peanut butter cups for the caramel candies and top with a cinnamon candy dot.

It's a good fall back recipe when you don't have time to bake cookies, cake or candy.

2022 Human Rights Day Message

10 December is Human Rights Day; that is because the United Nations' Universal Declaration of Human Rights was adopted by the United Nations General Assembly on 10 December 1948 in Paris, France. U. N. Headquarters in New York City was not finished until 1952. The Commission on Human Rights began its work in January 1947 under the chairpersonship of Eleanor Roosevelt (1984-1962). In thirty Articles, the Universal Declaration sets forth basic human rights and fundamental freedoms, to which all human beings are entitled to everywhere in the world without any discrimination. 2022 is the seventy-fourth anniversary of the Universal Declaration's adoption.

The United Nations' General Assembly has proclaimed the U. N.'s Universal Declaration of Human Rights as a "common standard of achievement for all peoples and nations." No U. N. Member State has a perfect human rights record, but all 193 U. N. Member States should aspire to realize the Universal Declaration's thirty Articles.

The U. N. has also adopted two Covenants to formally implement the U. N.'s Universal Declaration of Human Rights: the Covenant on Civil and Political Rights and the Covenant on Economic, Social and Cultural Rights. No U. N. Member State has currently formally adopted and implemented both of these Covenants. That remains to be achieved in the future, but it is imperative that the adoption and implementation of both these two covenants by all 193 U. N. Member States occur as quickly as possible.

Both the United Nations Charter and Universal Declaration of Human Rights categorically state that the realization of human rights is essential for the promotion and maintenance of world peace. Therefore, on Human Rights Day (10 December), every U. N. Member State and person should resolve to implement the Universal Declaration's thirty Articles. This will begin the process of leading our troubled, interdependent world in a much more constructive direction. In too many parts of the world, there are flagrant human rights violations and these must be eliminated if world peace is to prevail in the future.

Implementing the U. N.'s Universal Declaration of Human Rights throughout our independent world may be a daunting task but it is not an insurmountable one and should evoke humanity's foremost efforts. At the present moment in human history, there is nothing more important than the human family achieving and maintaining world peace. The United Nations' Universal Declaration of Human Rights and its thirty Articles should, therefore, be read by all people and implemented throughout our interdependent world in order to promote world peace and human betterment. The international clock of doom is ticking. There is no time to lose if the human family is to flourish and not be rendered extinct. The past cannot be retrieved; the future is in the making. Why not transform our troubled, interdependent world into a wonderful place for all? Reason and human intelligence must be made to triumph over human stupidity, selfishness, and irrationality.
