

ENDOWMENT TRUST

The Endowment Trust met on April 18th. As of that day, our total investments were \$1,016,239.74 and had earned 5.74% for the quarter. Much of our meeting focused on developing a policy for distribution of Endowment funds to meet church budgetary needs. Until now, the Endowment has been using an "income only" approach or dividends earned from investments. Another policy is "total return" which would be a per-

centage (usually 4-5%) of an average net asset value of the funds held that includes both income and capital appreciation of the investments. Our financial advisor, Michael Angelucci, is helping us make an informed decision. If total return policy is decided to be the better option, it will need congregation approval.

At the end of April the first installment of \$11,250 will have been made to the church coffers. Around the same time the final payment of approximately \$6,000 on the outstanding new sign will have been made. How exciting it was to seethe message: "Sunday Service 10:30 a.m. All Welcome" for the first time! Kudos to all involved in making this a reality.

For several years, the Endowment Trust has been stewarding a restricted Music fund (invested and cash assets of about \$23,500) – the use of which was to be determined by "the Music Committee." For the past few years there has not been a music committee. However, Barry Kent informed the Endowment that a music committee is being reestablished. It will be exciting to see what new directions this committee will go!

Our next scheduled meeting is July 18, 2023 at 6:00 pm in the Emerson Room. Church members are welcome to attend (please contact a Trustee in advance if you have a specific topic/question). One topic going forward will be determining the Endowment's future role in church budgets beyond this fiscal year.



CARING FOR ONE ANOTHER RECIPES

Provided by Christine Boczarska and Faith Pham

Christine Boczarska and Faith Pham are sisters and dedicated members of our Caring For One Another group. They provide occasional meals to church members on an as-needed basis. With the meal they generally include a "goodie bag" and a card on behalf of the Caring Group. Each month you'll find one of their healthy recipes here in *The Foreword* often incorporating fresh vegetables and even gluten-free.

Guava Quesitos

From Brandon Ivan Peña, foodandwine.com Total time 1 hour 15 min

Makes three dozen

1 1/2 (8 oz) pkg cream cheese, softened 1/2 cup powdered sugar 2 tsp vanilla 2 pkg frozen puff pastry, thawed. Use Pepperidge Farms 17.3 oz pkg 10 oz packaged guava paste, cut into 1/8 inch strips.

Note: You can use any jam or preserves instead. We generally use several different flavors for an interesting variety

1 large egg, lightly beaten 3 tsp granulated sugar



Preheat oven to 400 degrees F, with rack in lower third position. Line 4 large rimmed baking sheets with parchment paper. Stir together cream cheese, powdered sugar and vanilla in a medium bowl until combined.

Cut 9 squares from each sheet of puff pastry and evenly divide onto the 4 baking sheets. Working with one baking sheet at a time, spread about 1 1/2 teaspoons cream cheese mixture from one corner to the opposite corner of each square. Top the cream cheese with a strip of guava or about a teaspoon of preserves. Brush the pastry edges with the beaten egg and fold over one corner, pressing it down. Fold over the opposite corner and lightly press down so the corner adheres. This will create a cylinder shape with two open ends. Brush each cylinder with beaten egg and sprinkle on some granulated sugar. Transfer the baking sheet to the refrigerator for 15 minutes, uncovered. Repeat with the remaining squares.

Remove the first tray from the refrigerator and bake until golden brown and crisp, about 25 minutes. Cool and place on a fancy platter to serve. We used guava paste, cherry preserves, plum preserves, raspberry preserves and poppy seed with raisins for variety. You will get oohs and aahs!
