

MINISTER'S CORNER

Prayer for Living in Tension By Joseph M. Cherry

If we have any hope of transforming the world and changing ourselves, we must be bold enough to step into our discomfort, brave enough to be clumsy there, loving enough to forgive ourselves and others.

May we, as a people of faith, be granted the strength to be so bold, so brave, and so loving.

This is another one of my favorites from the dangerous little UUA anthology of meditations, *Voices from the Margins*. The dedication of the anthology states its intention as a vision for Unitarian Universalism in a multicultural world.

Joe Cherry and I were in seminary together. I learned a lot from Joe. I learned that one cannot merely look at someone and assume we know their story. With a typical 'white guy' name and a lack of accent, I had no idea that his heritage is Hispanic - that his experience of the world is that of a person of color. Joe also taught me that it is possible to tell a hard truth without it being fatal to the relationship. And it was Joe that challenged me to name my theology in three words. His was "There's always hope." Mine continues to be, "Love changes everything."

Joe's *Prayer for Living in Tension* names our deepest fears (discomfort, being clumsy, not being able to forgive) and gives us a reason to be bold, brave, and loving enough to confront those fears in community. All of the language is "we". Of course, we benefit from working on ourselves, but the true power comes from working in beloved community. May we be so bold, so brave, and so loving.

May saw another successful event from the FUN-draising Group as there were 50 people at their Kentucky Derby Party on Saturday, May 6th in the Emerson Room. It was a very enjoyable event and many positive comments were made about it on the following Sunday as well.

The next All Church event will be the new Sign Dedication and Board Picnic after the service on June 11th, Please see the *Weekly Update* for details. We hope to see everyone there.

May also saw two successful "work parties" on successive Fridays. At the first, the old sign was taken down and overhanging branches and brush that was interfering with the use of some of the paved parking spots on the Western side of the parking lot was cleared. At the second, work was begun to restore the lawn on the trench that was dug for the electrical connection to the new sign. We appreciate the efforts of all who participated.

The BOT has also approved necessary work on both our Fire Alarm System—more costly than we had expected— and on the replacement of the deteriorating wood on the outside of the Emerson Room—less costly than we had expected.

Two more very positive developments also seen in May: Greater attendance at Sunday Services and more new people at the services.

ENDOWMENT TRUST

Our next scheduled meeting is July 18, 2023 at 6:00 pm in the Emerson Room. Church members are welcome to attend (please contact a Trustee in advance if you have a specific topic/question). One topic going forward will be determining the Endowment's future role in

church budgets beyond this fiscal year.

On April 30th, the first installment of \$11,250 was made for our commitment to the church 2023 -24 operating budget. The final payment of approximately \$6,000 on our wonderful new sign is yet to made. The messaging on the sign is going to be a game changer.

Elaine Cusker and I have been digging in the archives of the Endowment and the church. One of the bits of information we retrieved was a list of people who are including the Endowment Trust in their wills. This has resulted in renewed interest in creating a Legacy Society/Circle – a more formal way encouraging and recognizing bequests for the Endowment. Expect to hear more about this in the future – because: "We pick fruit from trees we did not plant. We drink water from wells we did not dig. This is as it should be, so long as we dig and plant for those who come after us"

JIM SCOTT CONCERT, JUNE 17 & 18

UU singer & songwriter, Jim Scott will be with us for a concert on Saturday, June 17, in addition to the Sunday morning service, June 18. Circle the dates in your calendar and invite friends to attend as Jim shares a hopeful UU message through story and song.

Jim Scott has made it his business to create music celebrating the earth. With a warmth and authenticity he invites all to get involved through lyrical melodies and memorable verses. Jim played with the Paul Winter Consort for years and was co-composer of their Missa Gaia/Earth Mass. His guitar skill and enchanting manner led Pete Seeger to call him "Some kind of a magician." He's gone on to record 9 albums, and his choral music and guitar method are published by Hal Leonard Corp. A tireless activist, Jim often lends his talents to benefit concerts for progressive causes.

Jim has brought his contemporary and multicultural music to more than 700 UU Churches over three decades. His much loved "Gather the Spirit" and a number of others are included in the UU hymnbooks. Though often brought in as the "speaker," Jim's services are always very musical. Jim speaks with passion on ecology, justice and peace. His lyrical poetry and stories are calls to action, full of hope and gentle wit. With degrees from Eastman School of Music and Berklee College, Jim often works with choirs on his compositions and arrangements, inspiring singers to new levels of expression. As song-leader he lifts joyous participation from congregations. Former Co-chair of the UU Ministry for the Earth, Jim was involved in creating the "Green Sanctuary" program. Awarded a grant from the Fund for Unitarian Universalism, Jim compiled and arranged the "Earth and Spirit Songbook" 110 songs of ecology and peace.

CARING FOR ONE ANOTHER RECIPES

Christine Boczarska and Faith Pham are sisters and dedicated members of our Caring For One Another group. They provide occasional meals to church members on an as-needed basis. With the meal they generally include a "goodie bag" and a card on behalf of the Caring Group. Each month you'll find one of their healthy recipes here in *The Foreword* often incorporating fresh vegetables and even gluten-free.

This is a refreshing vegetable recipe that we had the pleasure of enjoying at Ming Teh restaurant in Fort Erie.

Vegetable Mix

1/2 pound white mushrooms, cut in half
1 pound sugar snap peas or snow peas
1 pound asparagus, cut into bite sized pieces
1 tsp vegetable bullion,
Better than Bullion brand
2 Tbsp corn starch
1/4 cup rice wine or any white wine Canola oil



Sauté the halved mushrooms gently in canola oil until just done. Set aside. Steam the peas and asparagus until cooked but still crunchy. Add to sautéed mushrooms.

In a medium sauce pan add the bullion, 1 cup of water, the rice wine and thoroughly stir in the cornstarch. Cook over medium heat until the mixture boils. Cook for 5 more minutes, adding more water if the mixture is too thick. Add the vegetables to the liquid and heat them through. Serve as a side to your main dish or serve with rice or noodles as a meal in itself. Enjoy!


