MINISTER'S CORNER



Shortly after I arrived at UU Amherst I asked a group of people to join me in a book study. The book I brought to them was a bit unusual, as it documented a non denominational Christian church's journey from 'death's door' to revitalization. I wanted us to see what we might glean from their story in service to our congregation. There were some basic differences (beyond theology), not the least of which was their governance structure. I've decided to share in this space some of the decisions that church made to turn themselves around.

The first thing they did was to decide to trust...their minister, their forward-thinking leaders, their capacity for change, and they were willing to toss out the "we tried that once, it didn't work" argument for the status quo. They risked and they engaged. They decided to become a "new generation" church - a church with attendees whose average age is at least as young as the average age of the community in which the church exists. You'd be amazed how many church systems need to be adjusted when a commitment to age younger is adopted.

What does the music sound like? What day is the main service held and at what time? How willing are we to be a little bit uncomfortable as we move from meeting the needs of the people who are already present to including the anticipated needs of those who need our life-giving message? I think this is going to be an important process of discernment.

A new generation congregation embraces five strategies:

- Adopt a New Mindset
- Identify the Essentials
- Reduce the Distractions
- Elevate Your Standards
- Building a Mentoring Culture

I look forward to sharing this journey with you.

BOARD REPORT

More progress has been made on needed repairs and upgrades to our buildings in July. AVA Roofing has completed the project to replace the deteriorating wood on the outside of the Emerson Room. Many thanks to Bob Johnson, Barry Kent, Bruce Becker and Don Tucker for their involvement in the project.

Additionally, Johnson Controls has completed the repairs and updates to our fire alarm system to ensure both our safety and our compliance with NYS rules and regulations. Special thanks to Bruce Becker for his expertise in this area and his direct involvement with Johnson Controls and Main Street Academy to get this done in a timely manner with a minimum of disruption all around.

The BOT is also looking at further necessary repairs for the Emerson Room, the Mansion and the Caretaker's Cottage.

This all takes money and while we look forward to the second quarterly contribution to our operating budget from the Endowment Trust, we also count on the pledges made to balance our budget. We are just over half-way through our fiscal year (the congregation voted to make it coincide with the calendar year last fall), so we ask that those of you who are not on the monthly payment system, or have not yet paid off your pledge, to please do so.

Thanks to Heike Jacob for starting up a Young Adult Group at our church. It's good to see younger people getting involved.

The FUN-draising group is planning two upcoming events: a Pancake Breakfast on July 30th, using the newly donated griddle that worked so well at the picnic, and a cocktail party that has been moved from August to a date in October. Details will be forthcoming.

I hope you all are enjoying your summer.

ENDOWMENT TRUST

Our next scheduled meeting is October 17, 2023 at 6:00 pm in the Emerson Room. Church members are welcome to attend (please contact a Trustee in advance if you have a specific topic/question).

At our July quarterly meeting, Mike Angelucci reviewed our portfolio performance over the past 90 days. As of June 30th the Endowment's total value was \$1,044,932.76. Bonds have been purchased specifically to mature in time for each installment of \$11,250 for our commitment to the church 2023 -24 operating budget. The final payment of approximately \$6,000 on our wonderful new sign is yet to be made. The BOT approved the Gift Giving Policy proposed by Endowment and we will introduce it to the congregation in the fall. With respect to renewing the Legacy Circle, Elaine Cusker, Barry Kent and Dorothy Reade will develop a plan to touch base with those who previously notified the Endowment that it was included in their wills as well as encouraging new commitments. Finally, to get our officer positions in sync with the new church Annual Meeting schedule, elections were held. New officers are: Chair - Lauraine Marcus, Recording Secretary – Elaine Cusker, Corresponding Secretary –Dorothy Reade, Treasurer – Barry Kent. Next election of officers will take place within one week after the church Annual Meeting.

Suggested books (thanks for the list, Marge Marcille!) include:

Louisa May Alcott: The Woman Behind Little Women by Harriet Reisen (recommended by Ellen Doyno)

The Invention of Air: A story of Science, Faith and Revolution (about Joseph Priestly) by Steven Johnson

American Bloomsbury by Susan Cheever - Personal stories of the Transcendentalists living in Concord in mid-19th century - all the famous characters (subtitle: *Louisa May Alcott, Ralph Waldo Emerson, Margaret Fuller, Nathaniel Hawthorne, and Henry David Thoreau: Their Lives, Their Loves, Their Work*)

Out of the Flames: The Remarkable Story of a Fearless Scholar, a Fatal Heresy and One of the Rarest Books in the World by Lawrence Gladstone and Nancy Gladstone - It's about Michael Servetus, martyred by Calvin.

The Great Agnostic: Robert Ingersoll and American Freethought by Susan Jacoby - Ingersoll was a resident of New York State - his home is open to the public. Not necessarily a UU but certainly a free thinker and all-around good guy.

The Life of John Murray by Iain H. Murray John Murray left England and established Universalism in the eastern US.

There should be a copy of *Bloomsbury* and of *Out of the Flames* in the Lending Library in the glass cabinet in the Emerson Room, along with other books that would fit the topic. All are probably available from Amazon, the library or people's favorite sellers. Another good option is inSpirit, the online UUA bookstore.org, which features the Skinner House imprint, or Beacon Press (beacon.org), the publishing arm of the Unitarian Universalist Association of Congregations.

We are weaving the container for ourselves, our children and our world.

CARING FOR ONE ANOTHER RECIPES Provided by Christine Boczarska and Faith Pham

Christine Boczarska and Faith Pham are sisters and dedicated members of our Caring For One Another group. They provide occasional meals to church members on an as-needed basis. With the meal they generally include a “goodie bag” and a card on behalf of the Caring Group. Each month you’ll find one of their healthy recipes here in *The Foreword* often incorporating fresh vegetables and even gluten-free.

You've probably been to Greek restaurants and had the Greek potatoes and wanted to do the recipe at home. Well here is the recipe and they go with anything.

Greek Lemon-roasted Potatoes

Grated zest and juice of 1 lemon
2 Tbsp olive oil
2 Tbsp water
1 tsp dried Greek oregano
6 medium baking or Yukon gold potatoes, peeled and cut in half
Sea salt and freshly cracked black pepper
Fresh chopped parsley and marjoram for garnish, optional



Preheat oven to 375° F

Whisk lemon juice, zest, olive oil, water and oregano in a small bowl to blend.

Toss potatoes with the lemon oil mixture in a small roasting pan. Season with salt and pepper. Roast potatoes in the oven until tender and golden brown, turning occasionally, about 35 minutes. Using a metal spatula, loosen potatoes from roasting pan to prevent sticking.

Sprinkle with freshly chopped parsley and marjoram, to serve.

Note: potatoes can be cut into wedges, if preferred, prior to coating with the lemon oil mixture and roasting.
