

MINISTER'S CORNER



"Waiting for Things to Come Back Around"

Last month I submitted a bit of a teaser that we'd be going through a virtual book discussion together; I read the book and I'm discussing it with you! The book is *For A New Generation*, by Christian church builder, Lee Kricher. This month we address the first of five strategies: <u>Adopt a New Mindset</u>.

Kricher talks about letting go of waiting for things to come back around. He tells a story of a steelworker in Pittsburgh in the 1980's. The man had been laid off by one of the steel mills that had ceased operations. When asked what he planned to do for a living, the man replied, "I am not changing careers. My grandfather

was a steelworker, my father was a steelworker, and I am a steelworker. I'm waiting for things to come back around."

Spoiler alert: Things didn't come back around. They rarely do - whether it is in industry or in the life of a congregation. We've tried in many ways to live in a paradigm that is just plain over. Since September is the beginning of the program year, we have the opportunity to learn new ways of being and doing, starting now: adopt a new mindset.

One of the things that Kricher's church did to change their mindset was to trust their pastor as a change leader. That might seem self-serving, but I hope you recognize that all of my efforts in the past 8 years have been for the health and vitality of the congregation. Some changes have been intentional, while others have been thrust upon us. We've weathered the changes together. There will be more; there have to be. The past holds only lessons and memories - we cannot return there.

I'm excited about the program year before us. We're going to do new and exciting things. We are on our way to becoming a New Generation congregation.

COVID TASK FORCE UPDATE

Covid is still with us and showing a resurgence. The UUCA Covid Task Force is recommending the following guidelines, which follow the Center for Disease Control recommendation:

BOARD REPORT

Our signature event, the Living Green Festival will take place on Saturday, September 23rd, with set-up to take place on Friday, September 22, followed by a pot luck and bonfire. All members of the congregation are invited! Please spread the word to family and friends. Volunteers will be needed: contact Jeanine Moyer if you're able to help out. We will need everyone involved to make it a successful event!

We have received the second quarterly check from the Endowment Trust to support our operating budget. Many thanks to them for the commitment they made.

Speaking of volunteers: thanks to Barry Kent, Don Tucker and their assistant for completing the exterior Emerson Room project by dealing with the decrepit wooden panels on the east side of the building that could not be removed by AVA roofing due to the potential damage to the Emerson Room's rubber roof. Hard work in the hot sun.

Gateway Update: As we have experienced an increase in trespassing on our campus by Gateway residents, the BOT reached out to the organization to request a meeting with their leadership, and they were very responsive. It did not hurt that their CEO is a member of UU East Aurora and named the late Mike Moran as his mentor. The meeting went very well, and in addition to increased cooperation between our two communities, we discussed arranging possible positive interactions with their residents and our congregation. We may see some of them at the Living Green Festival. On the cooperation side, we have authorized their supervisory personnel to come on to our property when necessary to search for a missing resident. They will have name badges identifying them as Gateway personnel.

Caretaker Last Day & Carriage House Repairs: Andy Andersen gave us notice that Friday, September 1st will be his last day as Caretaker. We are sorry to see him go as he has gone above and beyond his duties, undertaking and completing many projects either on his own or with the assistance of members of our community. When he came to us, he had indicated that he would be with us about a year so this is not a surprise. We need to have several repairs done to the carriage house before we can seek a new Caretaker. In the meantime, we are working on covering the Caretaker's responsibilities among ourselves. We will also be seeking volunteers to help clean the carriage house in mid-September.

Door Entry and Security: The BOT has engaged Amherst Alarm to provide security cameras at our two main entrances so that our staff and Rev. Michelle can determine who is at the doors. They will have the ability to remotely open the doors as well. We also expect to have an electronic entry system using key fobs for volunteers that need access when staff members are not present. We will be seeking donations to defray the cost of these improvements to make us all safer.

FUN-draising Group: As always, the FUN-draising group continues to be hard work. They have already created a large number of raffle baskets for the Living Green Festival with more in the works, and will be providing the food at the event. Be sure to save the dates for the following: Adult Cocktail Party, Saturday, October 14, in the Emerson Room, and a Pancake Breakfast to kick-off the 2024 Generosity Campaign, Sunday, October 15.

Generosity Campaign: 2024 will mark the 70th Anniversary of the founding of UUCA, which will be the focus of this falls' pledge drive. We are expecting our members to be generous with their pledges as our community keeps moving forward.

Suggested books (thanks for the list, Marge Marcille!) include:

Louisa May Alcott: The Woman Behind Little Women by Harriet Reisen (recommended by Ellen Doyno)
The Invention of Air: A Story of Science, Faith and Revolution (about Joseph Priestly) by Steven Johnson

American Bloomsbury by Susan Cheever - Personal stories of the Transcendentalists living in Concord in mid-19th century - all the famous characters (subtitle: Louisa May Alcott, Ralph Waldo Emerson, Margaret Fuller, Nathaniel Hawthorne, and Henry David Thoreau: Their Lives, Their Loves, Their Work)

Out of the Flames: The Remarkable Story of a Fearless Scholar, a Fatal Heresy and One of the Rarest Books in the World by Lawrence Gladstone and Nancy Gladstone - It's about Michael Servetus, martyred by Calvin.

The Great Agnostic: Robert Ingersoll and American Freethought by Susan Jacoby - Ingersoll was a resident of New York State - his home is open to the public. Not necessarily a UU but certainly a free thinker and allaround good guy.

The Life of John Murray by Iain H. Murray John Murray left England and established Universalism in the eastern US.

There should be a copy of *Bloomsbury* and of *Out of the Flames* in the Lending Library in the glass cabinet in the Emerson Room, along with other books that would fit the topic. All are probably available from Amazon, the library or people's favorite sellers. Another good option is inSpirit, the online UUAbookstore.org, which features the Skinner House imprint, or Beacon Press (beacon.org), the publishing arm of the Unitarian Universalist Association of Congregations.

We want to teach our children to be able to be present with people of all different ages and abilities, respect different beliefs, be calm and fulfilled. We can do this. Sure, there may be some squirrely wiggles, and at the same time, kids need these opportunities to practice their skills, to make mistakes, think it over and try again. Continuing to send them out no longer makes sense.

CARING FOR ONE ANOTHER RECIPES

Christine Boczarska and Faith Pham are sisters and dedicated members of our Caring For One Another group. They provide occasional meals to church members on an as-needed basis. With the meal they generally include a "goodie bag" and a card on behalf of the Caring Group. Each month you'll find one of their healthy recipes here in *The Foreword* often incorporating fresh vegetables and even gluten-free.

It's the season for zucchini, and stuffing and baking them is a delicious way to enjoy them. There are many options for ingredients to stuff zucchini with. You can go with meat, cheese, bread crumbs and vegetables, eggs, mushrooms, but the most important thing to remember is to pre-bake them.

Stuffed Zucchini with Fresh Vegetables

Time: about 1 hour total. Set oven to 350°

2 large zucchini
1/2 cup bread crumbs, plain or seasoned
1 medium tomato, chopped
1/2 small onion, chopped
2 Tbsp butter
4 large portobello mushrooms, chopped
4 Tbsp grated Parmesan cheese
Salt and pepper



Important: Wash the zucchini and microwave whole for about 4-6 minutes until softer but not mushy. You can also cook them whole in a toaster oven at 350 degrees until softer but not mushy. Allow to cool and cut each in half lengthwise, scooping out the seeds so you have a nice trough to fill. Reserve the seeds,

In a saucepan melt the butter over medium heat and add the breadcrumbs, onion and mushrooms and cook until the veggies are soft.

Remove from heat and mix in the zucchini seeds, chopped tomatoes and Parmesan cheese. Add salt and pepper to taste. Fill each zucchini with the mixture.

Place the filled zucchini on a parchment lined pan and bake in a 350 degree oven for about 1/2 hour until lightly browned. Serve with salad and your main course. Leftovers can easily be refrigerated and reheated.

You can also add cooked Italian sausage, cream cheese or one whipped egg to the cooked mixture, as you prefer. The fresh taste of zucchini is a good compliment for any stuffing you add to it.

PS: These are also good warm or cold, sliced in small pieces, as appetizers.

For now, the process for checks remains the same: Make payable to UU Amherst with "Pantry" in the memo line.
