

Are you paying attention? Do you feel the tremors of the Great Turning? A new world is emerging and it is up to us to bring it to birth. We are the central actors in this drama.



MINISTER'S CORNER

A meditation on Policy Governance... (Yes, you read that right! A meditation.)

You see, we have been working on shaping our structure as a congregation to *policy governance* for over six years - with some success - and with some frustration. Sometimes it has felt like pounding on a square peg, insisting that it fit into a round hole.



The Hotchkiss model that we have engaged shows two circles (pies); one for Governance and one for Ministry. The areas of congregational life that have been part of the Governance pie are the committees that serve the Board: Finance, Personnel, Campus Support (facilities & grounds), Leadership Development & Nominating; and Committee on Mission.

The Ministry Pie is the relational side of congregational life, and under the purview of the minister: Connections, Worship, Caring, Restoration Circles, Music, Clothing, Green Justice, Social Justice, Publicity & Marketing, Young Adult & Campus Ministry, Faith Development; and by extension, the Little Free Pantry, Fundraising, the Women's Group, and Safety. The Committee on Mission has moved between the pies.

For over six years, we have tried to work in two different spheres - even though there were areas of congregational life that spilled over. We are discovering that communication between the spheres is lacking, and some areas of congregational life don't fit easily into one or the other. Do we need to throw it all away and start over?

No, I don't think so. Recently, in my spiritual endeavors, I have been introduced to the image of the *Vesica Piscis* (see the diagram above). It has spiritual applications, but I think it might have more practical applications as well. There is an area of overlap between two spheres where shared communication happens; intentional shared space. Everything about congregational life is connected to every other part - yet, we get into trouble if everything falls to one side (Governance) or the other (Ministry).

By the way, that middle space is fluid - projects and ideas may pass through and rest for a while in one or the other 'pie'. Oh, and that middle space is not where everything falls to the minister or everything falls to the Board. The only way we can be a truly healthy congregation is to have good boundaries and to respect those boundaries, while enhancing communication. We can do this!

In addition to the usual votes on our operating budget and our contribution to the UUA, there are important votes on our by-laws: adjusting our quorum to fit the current membership total and providing clarity to our membership rules.

There will also be a proposal that requires congregational vote for the Endowment Trust regarding their on-going annual contribution to our operations budget. Their 2023 contributions have helped make possible all we have been doing around the church and we look forward to their continuance in 2024.



Part of "Reimagining Ourselves" in our 70th Anniversary year has led to the formation of a Safety Committee. We recently arranged a visit from members of the Amherst Police Department who were impressed with our new key fob entry and video intercom/door release systems. There is still much to do and I want to thank those who have agreed to serve on this committee with me: Bob Johnson, Sue Gorski, Lauraine Marcus and Kim Diana Connolly.

CONNECTING THOUGHTS

Inclusion is My Word of the Year Linda Joy Groat

Inclusion, according to www.merriam-webster.com: is the act or practice of including and accommodating people who have historically been excluded (due to race, gender, religion, ethnicity, sexuality, physical/mental ability, etc). I believe it is a mindset. A value. An intentional choice that we nurture, grow, and eventually develop into habit. It aligns with our UU principle that Each and Every Person is Important and deserves to be treated with Dignity and Respect. Closely aligned with Inclusion are the values of diversity and equity.

A synonym for diversity is variety. Variety is what we are hoping for when we invite people into our congregation. We want people of all walks of life to participate in our programs and activities. The more diverse, the better. Additionally, we want all those who feel like "outsiders" or "others" to find Belonging in our community. This aligns with our UU principle; Respect for the Interdependent Web of All Existence, of which we are each a Part. Remember my December article on the snowflakes??

Equity, being impartial and fair, is inherent in our UU principles. Not everyone is lucky enough to have their basic needs met, let alone higher level needs. As UU's (and arguably, as compassionate beings of any group), we must speak for those who have no voice and no ability to advocate for their needs or to improve their circumstances. Recently, I lost my voice for two weeks, due to a cold, and I felt the impact of not being able to communicate verbally. Imagine if I could not write or type my needs - which I was privileged to still be able to do. This is where we need to imagine ourselves, if we are to help others who have no such privilege.

When I look around UU Amherst, I am pleased to see the growing diversity of ages, stages, abilities, genders, races, ethnicities, backgrounds, economic means, religious beliefs, and more that I am sure we don't even know of, yet. We all have gifts to share with each other and in 2024, I encourage all of us to engage in Daring Leadership (Brene Brown, *Dare to Lead*), and embrace and actively promote Inclusion, by examining our language, written and spoken; our practices and procedures (new and old); our habits, and see how we can change to be more inclusive, to be more welcoming and tolerant. It might be as simple as changing where we sit during service, trying a new thing out of our comfort zone, or introducing ourselves to a person we have never met before.

There's no blame or shame intended in this, only learning and growing. We cannot change what we do not know is a problem. We must be brave and vulnerable at the same time (again, Brene). We can accept the things we cannot change, summon the courage to change the things we can and have the wisdom to know the difference (Serenity Prayer). And we can do Small Things with Great Love (Mother Theresa).

ENDOWMENT TRUST



The Endowment Trust ended 2023 with \$1,088,013.00 (+ 9.29%) total value of our funds with Level Wealth Management with an additional \$5,580 in Citizen Bank. Most of the fund growth has been attributable to its investment in ESG funds which did very well in the stock market this year. ESG stands for Environment, Social and Governance. The public companies included in an ESG fund are evaluated according to how well they safeguard the environment and the communities where they work,

as well as how they ensure management and corporate governance meet high standards. Here's a closer look at the three criteria used to evaluate companies for ESG investing:

- **Environment.** What kind of impact does a company have on the environment? This can include a company's carbon footprint, its abstinence from or mitigation of toxic chemicals involved in its manufacturing and other processes and its pursuit of sustainability throughout its supply chain.
- Social. How does the company improve its social impact, both within the company and in the broader community? Social factors include everything from LGBTQ+ equality to racial diversity in both the executive suite and staff overall, and inclusion programs and hiring practices. It even looks at how a company advocates for social good in the wider world, beyond its own limited sphere of business.
- Governance. How does the company's board and management drive positive change? Governance
 includes everything from issues surrounding executive pay to diversity in leadership as well as how
 well that leadership responds to and interacts with shareholders.

If you're interested in exploring an ESG strategy, there are multiple ways to identify investments including do-it-yourself research and use of robo-advisors as well as financial advisors.

At the end of our January meeting, Elaine Cusker resigned from the Endowment Trust. Her vacancy will be filled at the Church Annual Meeting in February. At the meeting, the congregation will be asked to approve the Endowment's October 2023 action for future budget contributions: On an annual basis, the Endowment Trust commits to provide a gift to the UU Amherst up to 5% of the total value of unrestricted funds for the operating budget. (This commitment will be reviewed at each Endowment October meeting.) After the Annual Meeting, the Endowment Trustees will meet to determine officers for the coming year.

During the last quarter of 2023, we received the following donations: Murray - \$100; Moran - \$30 (Brasure), Christ - \$50 (Howells), Cusker - \$200, Stewart - \$500 (Stewart), Jordan - \$500 (Stewart), Moran - \$50 (G. Little), Kubala - \$50 (G. Little). In addition, the Cuskers will be recognized with a \$500 leaf on the Endowment Tree for their cumulative donations to the Endowment.

The next scheduled meeting for the Endowment is April 16th at 6:00 pm in the Emerson Room.

CARING FOR ONE ANOTHER RECIPES

Christine Boczarska and Faith Pham are sisters and dedicated members of our Caring For One Another group. They provide occasional meals to UU Amherst members on an as-needed basis. With the meal they generally include a "goodie bag" and a card on behalf of the Caring Group. Each month you'll find one of their healthy recipes here in *The Foreword* often incorporating fresh vegetables and even gluten-free.

This is a slightly different gingerbread recipe from Melissa Clark of The New York Times. It has the chewy texture of brownies with wonderful spicy flavor.

Gingerbread Blondies

Melissa Clark. The New York Times

1 hour prep and bake About 16 squares

1 cup unsalted butter plus more for prepping the pan

1 1/2 cups packed dark brown sugar

2 Tbsp molasses

1 Tbsp finely grated fresh, peeled ginger

2 large eggs

2 Tbsp vanilla extract

2 cups all-purpose flour

2 tsp baking powder

2 tsp ground ginger

1 tsp ground cinnamon

1/8 tsp kosher salt


1/4 tsp ground allspice

1/4 tsp freshly ground black pepper

Pinch of ground cloves

1/4 cup toasted walnuts or pecans (optional) Powdered sugar for dusting (optional)

Heat oven to 350 degrees. Grease a 9" X 9" pan and line with parchment paper.



Add eggs and vanilla extract and whisk until smooth and glossy. Add next eight ingredients. Whisk well to combine. Stir in nuts, if using.

Pour batter into prepared pan. Bake until edges are firm but the center is still slightly damp, about 18 to 25 minutes. (Add 5 to 10 minutes if using a glass or ceramic pan.) Transfer pan to a wire rack to cool.

Once gingerbread is cool, dust with powdered sugar. Makes about 16 squares.
