

BOARD REPORT

Thanks to all of our voting members who attended, in-person or on-line, our annual meeting on February 25th that made a quorum possible. We passed the both the 2024 budget and our annual contribution to the UUA, the latter keeps us in "good standing" which allows us access to grants and loans from UUA. We will be exploring those where appropriate later this year.

Two by-law changes passed, and based on concerns from the congregation we will look at further clarifying the membership language we have. The biggest change was to make the quorum for our meetings a percentage of voting membership rather than a fixed number, which should ensure we are able to conduct the necessary business of the church at our congregational meetings.



Last month I reported on the discovery in February of the failure of a pump in one of our five heating systems and it's replacement, resulting in heat again being provided to our main bathrooms. In early March, Rev. Michelle alerted us to the very worrying sounds coming from the furnace room on seconf floor of the FD wing. A quick call to J&S Mechanical, our primary HVAC contractor, resulted in a technician arriving rapidly to replace a badly overheated motor that was in the process of failing.

Due to the continuing issues with our numerous heating systems, raising money for their repair or replacement is the FOCI for the next year or so. Don Tucker and Wendy Scott will be heading that campaign, and we all owe them our thanks for doing so.

In a sign of spring, Linda Joy is getting our Gardeners Group together. They may have some assistance this year as I reached out to our neighbors at Gateway who had previously expressed interest in having some of their people work alongside ours.

Our current BOT members would like to welcome our new members, Betty Crump and Wendy Scott. We look forward to working together.

Although recipients remain anonymous (there is no reporting), scrupulous records are kept to ensure that monies are distributed responsibly, should there ever be an audit of the Fund.





After the Annual Meeting in February, the Endowment Trustees welcomed Tammy Kofke who will be serving a 5-year term ending in 2029. An email discussion resulted in the following decision on officers for the coming year: Lauraine Marcus—chair, Barry Kent—Treasurer, Dorothy Reade—Corresponding Secretary, Tammy Kofke—Recording Secretary. The formal Board of Trustee request for \$51,000 contribution to this year's church operating budget was received. After a series of motions and votes conducted via email, the Endowment authorized the financial advisor to buy short term bonds (3, 6 and 9

month) which will mature so that quarterly payments of \$12,500 can be made. Unlike this past year, the total contribution will be made within the church fiscal year.

The next scheduled meeting for the Endowment is April 16th at 6:00 pm in the Emerson Room. At that time, we will have new officers and a new trustee. If you are interested in attending one of our metings, pease let one of the trustees know.

Faith Development (FD) within our Unitarian Universalist Congregation is for all ages and stages and families of all sorts and sizes. Youth Faith Development (YFD) focuses on those between the ages 0-18. Together, paid staff and volunteers from our congregation offer opportunities for spirituality, community and values building, through fun, intergenerational crafts, games and activities on Sunday mornings and during special events.

Students from UB's Environmental Advocacy Clinic will be the presenters. (These are the student attorneys who, along with students in UB's Entrepreneurship Law Clinic, have been collaborating with us as we work through the process of becoming a 501(c)(3) non-profit organization. A Restorative Practices Policy will be part of ALFP Ltd bylaws.)



Following the Green Justice Team's first meeting of the year on March 7, many thoughts about our purpose and rationale for presenting the third annual Living Green Festival emerged.

UUCA has been researching and acting on projects that use its space in environmentally friendly ways. It has installed solar panels on the roof, earned a green certification, reduced the use of lighting and disposable products, planted crops and trees, organized a food pantry, instituted various recycling efforts, and planned renovations to our facilities with the best practices in renewable design and building.

CARING FOR ONE ANOTHER RECIPES

Christine Boczarska and Faith Pham are sisters and dedicated members of our Caring For One Another group. They provide occasional meals to UU Amherst members on an as-needed basis. With the meal they generally include a "goodie bag" and a card on behalf of the Caring Group. Each month you'll find one of their healthy recipes here in *The Foreword* often incorporating fresh vegetables and even gluten-free.

Spring Lemon Ricotta Pasta

Recipe from Dash's Market

2 Tbsp extra virgin olive oil

1 cup panko crumbs

1/2-1 tsp crushed red pepper flakes

3/4 lb of angel hair pasta

Kosher salt and black pepper

6 Tbsp cold salted butter

1 lemon, sliced, seeds removed

1 cup fresh basil, chopped


1 zucchini or yellow summer squash, very thinly sliced

3-4 cloves garlic, minced or grated

2 Tbsp fresh thyme leaves (or 2 tsp dried thyme)

8 oz ricotta cheese, whipped if desired

Heat a large skillet over medium heat. Add the olive oil, the breadcrumbs, and crushed red pepper flakes. Cook, stirring occasionally util the breadcrumbs are toasted all over, about 4 minutes. Remove the breadcrumbs from the skillet. Lastly season with salt.



Meanwhile, set your skillet over medium-high heat. Add the 2 tablespoons of butter and lemon slices. Sear until the lemon is caramelized, about 1 minute per side. Remove the lemon from the skillet. Finely chop the lemon slices and mix with the basil.


To the skillet, add the remaining butter, zucchini, garlic, and thyme. Season with salt and pepper. Cook until the zucchini is golden, 5 minutes. Watch the garlic closely. Remove from the heat, stir in the pasta and half of the lemon/basil.

Spread the ricotta into bowls. Add the pasta. Top with breadcrumbs and additional lemon/basil.

April U.U.—U.N.NEWS

9 March 2024

According to the U.N. Charter, the primary purpose of the U.N. is to eliminate the scourge of war and promote human rights—in a word, the maintenance of international peace and security. However, the U.N. at present does not have the power to maintain world peace. That is because the U.N. does not possess its own effective system of collective security to keep the peace, thereby allowing for universal and complete disarmament under U.N. auspices. The world spends over a trillion dollars a year on armaments. The United States of America spends at least 700 billion dollars per year on such instruments of death and destruction. Other U.N. Member States are not blameless either. The human family needs a change of heart and needs to concert its swords into ploughshares under U.N. auspices; otherwise, the future of humanity is bleak, indeed.

During January 2024, U.N. Secretary-General António Gutierres addressed the 193 Members of the U.N. General Assembly on this matter. In his first address of the new year to the U.N. General Assembly, he called for action to address threats to world peace in the world's hotspots, action to promote sustainable development and action to protect the Earth. "We are capable of global citizenship and all U.N. Member States must also do their part to empower the U.N. itself." The U.N. should not have to plead with its 193 U.N. Member States to support its main purpose: the maintenance of international peace and security.

U.N. Secretary-General Gutierres deplored the continuing violence in Ukraine, Syria, South Sudan, the Central African Republic, the Democratic Republic of the Congo, Iraq, Afghanistan, Palestine, etc. "The international community must also focus greater attention on the interrelated threats of organized crime, terrorism, piracy, extremism, and trafficking in drugs, people and arms," he said. This includes continuing to strive towards achieving a nuclear-weapons-free world. U.N. Secretary-General António Gutierres also emphasized the need to make progress towards achieving the U.N.'s Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) and the U.N.'s Agenda 2030. The current, virulent global pandemic must be eliminated in a scientific manner. This is a matter of the utmost urgency. Too many people doubt the efficacy of the current vaccines and the need to wear masks.

U.N. Secretary-General António Gutierres also warned all 193 U.N. Member States against succumbing to the myth that sustainable development is incompatible with robust action to control climate change and global warming. "Evidence shows that the goals of eradicating poverty, promoting inclusive growth and keeping global temperature increases below two degrees Celsius, are mutually reinforcing," U. N. Secretary-General António Gutierres argued. A voluntary climate change treaty (the Paris Agreement on Climate Change) has been adopted by the international community and should be implemented as soon as possible.

Humanity's major problems—world peace, universal disarmament, sustainable development, global warming, war, terrorism, militarism, poverty, natural and manmade disasters, diseases and human rights violations, etc. need an effective U.N. to solve them. Unfortunately, these are the actual problems of our troubled, interdependent world and they have not yet been solved. There is no time to lose. The human family needs to get its house in order or perish. This sad situation may not be pleasant to contemplate, but it is the truth. The insurgency against science, reason, logic and truth must cease. What human beings have created, human beings can change. A more humane and just world is still possible. However, human beings have to make this happen and to accomplish this they must overcome the forces of social inertia and human complacency.
