

#### MINISTER'S CORNER

Dear Friends.

This month I share with you an excerpt from the Fall 2007 edition of UU World that features Carolyn McDade's, "Spirit of Life," the song that has defined a generation of Unitarian Universalists and provided common ground amidst our theological differences. Of course this song can be sung, but have you considered using the lyrics as a spoken prayer? When a dear friend lost her wife unexpectedly to a heart attack, I asked another friend to create prayer beads for her, using the natural breath points in "Spirit of Life." When I presented those beads to my friend, a former nun, she was able to transform the comforting use of prayer beads to be resonant with her UU faith.

I have shared these words with the dying, the newly born, the hurting, and the joyful. I wonder what it would be like for you to journey with these words throughout the month of June as we consider what it means to engage in Renewal.

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#### From the UU World article:

No other song, no other prayer, no other piece of liturgy is so well known and loved in Unitarian Universalism as "Spirit of Life" by Carolyn McDade.

It is our Doxology, or perhaps our "Amazing Grace." Many congregations sing it every Sunday, or at least enough to know the words by heart. Sermons have been devoted to this one song. It is sung at weddings and memorial services, around campfires and at demonstrations, at cradles and hospital bedsides.

In six short lines "Spirit of Life" touches so much that is central to our faith—compassion, justice, community, freedom, reverence for nature, and the mystery of life. It finds the common ground held by humanists and theists, pagans and Christians, Buddhists and Jews, gay and straight among us.

Spirit of Life, come unto me.
Sing in my heart all the stirrings of compassion.
Blow in the wind, rise in the sea;
Move in the hand, giving life the shape of justice.
Roots hold me close; wings set me free;
Spirit of Life, come to me, come to me.

As I write this in mid-May I look back at two events we had recently at our campus, the highly enjoyable Kentucky Derby Party and the UUA Governance/ Ministry refresher conducted by Rene Ruchtozke, our district executive. In addition to the presentation and discussion we interacted with board members and ministers from both the downtown church and First Universalist of Rochester. Not surprising to learn that they, like we, have their challenges as well, some similar, some not. We intend to develop a more cooperative relationship with the downtown folks so both of our congregations can benefit.

Looking forward to June we have a combined event — the All-Church Picnic aka Board Picnic on Sunday, June 9th, and the "Grand Opening" of the newly renovated space on the first floor of the FD wing which for 26 years was used by the Main Street Children's

Academy. After all that time it has been a major project to make that space both attractive and useful for our congregation. We needed the time and energy of our volunteers who pitched in as well as the services of professional contractors to make it happen.

None of it would have happened without the Task Force Members who had the energy, vision and dedication to see it through. #### **ENDOWMENT TRUST**

Most importantly, Dorothy Reade's resignation was accepted. She served as treasurer and then corresponding secretary during her two and half years and we will miss her. Her term expires in 2027.

According to the Second Declaration of Trust: In the event an Endowment Trustee is unable to complete his or her term of office, the Church Trustees shall, by majority vote, appoint a successor who has been nominated by the Endowment Trustees to complete

the balance of that year. A successor Endowment Trustee shall be nominated and elected at the next annual meeting to complete the balance of the term.

As a result, the Endowment recommended and the Board of Trustees approved Dian Tucker to serve until the Annual Meeting. At that time, the Leadership and Nominating Committee will offer candidates to replace Lauraine Marcus for a 5 year term and to complete the balance of Dorothy's term.

The Endowment is looking forward to Dian Tucker joining the team and will assuming corresponding secretary responsibilities.

The value of the trust on May 1st was \$1,082,069.22. The music committee value was \$25,671.73

The next scheduled meeting for the Endowment is July 16<sup>th</sup> at 6:00 pm in the Emerson Room. If you are interested in attending our meeting, please let one of the trustees know.

#### CARING FOR ONE ANOTHER RECIPES

Provided by Christine Boczarska and Faith Pham

Christine Boczarska and Faith Pham are sisters and dedicated members of our Caring For One Another group. They provide occasional meals to UU Amherst members on an as-needed basis. With the meal they generally include a "goodie bag" and a card on behalf of the Caring Group. Each month you'll find one of their healthy recipes here in *The Foreword* often incorporating fresh vegetables and even gluten-free.

This is an Indian vegetarian dish that is very flavorful and easy to make and clean up after. It comes from the Weight Watchers cookbook.

#### Sheet Pan Aloo Gobi

- 1 hour total time Serves 4
- 2 large russet potatoes cut in one inch chunks (about 4 cups)
- 4 cups large cauliflower florets (from one medium head)
- 1 small onion cut into 1/2 inch slices
- 2 Tbsp finely chopped peeled fresh ginger
- 1 Tbsp finely chopped garlic
- 1 Tbsp olive oil
- 1 1/2 tsp cumin seeds
- 1/4 tsp ground turmeric
- 1/2 tsp garam masala
- Pinch of cayenne pepper
- 1 tsp salt
- 1 Tbsp fresh lime juice (from 2 limes)
- 1/4 cup fresh cilantro, chopped



Preheat the oven to 400 degrees F. Line a large sheet pan with parchment paper.

In a large bowl, toss the potatoes, cauliflower, onion, garlic, ginger, oil, cumin seeds, turmeric, garam masala, cayenne and salt until we'll combined. Spread the vegetables in an even layer on the prepared pan.

Roast the vegetables, stirring once halfway through cooking, until browned and tender, about 45 minutes. Before serving, toss the vegetables with the lime juice and cilantro.

Easy-peasy and minimal clean up necessary.
