

MINISTER'S CORNER

Dear Friends,

It's hard to believe, but we are beginning our 10th year together! I first came to this congregation in August of 2015 as a Developmental Minister, with a 3-year contract, to join together to do the work of shared ministry. The congregation had been through some bumpy times that had eroded trust in one another and in the possibility of a brighter future.

We spent the first year getting to know one another and s-l-o-w-l-y building trust. We took our time and had deep conversations about what it meant to live together in covenant, and by the end of that program year, we had a congregational covenant that still guides how we interact and understand ourselves as a congregation.

The second year was focused on creating a mission statement. Again, we held meetings and workshops to discern what we felt would be a statement that described UU Amherst, and that would inspire our shared ministry in the community.

In Year Three, we took all we had learned about being in respectful relationship with one another and with a sense of mission, and we hammered out a strategic plan. And I mean, hammered out. We enlisted a local organization to help us in the effort, and by the end of the program year, we had a strategic plan (which we actually accomplished!).

It was during that third year that we also decided that we worked pretty well together, and the congregation affirmed that by calling me to be your settled minister in 2018. Since then, we have done some really good work together, weathered some storms, and have worked really hard to make UU Amherst a truly welcoming spiritual home. I am so grateful for all we have done and all that we are visioning for the future.

The task force for the new boiler project has met with three different HVAC contractors and we are awaiting proposals. We learned different things from them all and have decided that the best place to put the new boiler is in the former coat closet where the pantry used to store their food.

The contractors all agree on that location, and we now must check in with the Town of Amherst Building Dept. to see what requirements must be met in order to obtain the proper permits for construction.



We hope to decide on a plan to bring to the congregation soon. It may be September before we are able to have the congregational meeting to authorize the plan and the spending needed to get it done.

Facilities Reminders

Admitting Unknown Visitors: Please be cautious about admitting non-members/unfamiliar visitors to the building. Be sure to ask the nature of their visit and always encourage them to make an appointment if there is someone specific who can assist them. As a precaution, you should not admit unknown individuals to the building who are: not here for a maintenance/ service call; who do not have a pre-arranged appointment; or who are not attending a meeting or event. Also, if they are here for a service call, they should be able to identify themselves in uniform, name of the company, or a business card.

Additionally, if you are a member visiting the church and have not yet met our staff, please understand that you may be asked to identify yourself before you're admitted to the building. Unannounced drop-in visits from unfamiliar members are always treated by the staff with caution. This is a safety measure. It's ALWAYS recommended that you call the office on business days to let staff know that you plan to visit.

ENDOWMENT TRUST



Articles about the Endowment Trust appear monthly in the *Foreword*, generally focusing on status and actions. However, its history is important.

The Endowment Trust was created in 1989 and in 1994 it became a separate 501c3 organization. The purpose of the trust is to invest and manage gifts and bequest made to the Church by its members and other individuals and entities with the goal to sufficient principal to generate income that may be used to assist the Church in operating and capital expenses.

In 2008, the Endowment Trust created a Legacy Society—getting commitments from Church members to include UU Amherst in their will. This is a project that went dormant and is being reenergized.

However, a more visible representation of supporting the future of UU Amherst is the Endowment Tree that can be found in the Atrium. Since its inception, the Endowment Trust also grew through small donations in memory of a loved one or honorariums. In 2010, the Endowment Tree (crafted by Hinni Martens) became a fixture in the Atrium. Donors' contributions are accumulated and as a specific donation level is reached a different color leaf is added to the tree with their name on it (\$4,500+ yellow, \$2,000 light gold, \$5,000 Bronze, \$10,000 Steel, \$20,000 Gold). Stroll up to Atrium and see if you can find it. This month we added four leaves to the tree: \$2000 Dick Ott; \$500+ Elaine & Joe Cusker, Jayne & Brian Murray, and Gilbert Jordan.

The value of the trust on June 30 was \$1,136,881.85.

CARING FOR ONE ANOTHER RECIPES

Christine Boczarska and Faith Pham are sisters and dedicated members of our Caring For One Another group. They provide occasional meals to UU Amherst members on an as-needed basis. With the meal they generally include a "goodie bag" and a card on behalf of the Caring Group. Each month you'll find one of their healthy recipes here in *The Foreword* often incorporating fresh vegetables and even gluten-free.

Broccoli Salad with Cranberries and Bacon

1/2 cup plain fat free Greek yogurt

1/4 cup lite mayonnaise

1 tablespoon cider vinegar

1/2 teaspoon Kosher salt

1/4 teaspoon black pepper

8 cups broccoli florets, chopped (1Head), blanched

1/2 cup dried, low sugar cranberries

1/3 cup red onion, chopped

5 slices of bacon, cooked crisp and crumbled

1/4 cup sunflower seeds (kernels), toasted

In a large bowl whisk together the yogurt, mayonnaise, vinegar, salt and pepper. Add the rest of the ingredients and toss well to coat. Serve fresh or refrigerate for up to two days for flavors to blend. For a vegetarian/vegan dish, substitute as appropriate the yogurt, mayonnaise and bacon with vegan products.

Church Custodial Team Request for Assistance

The Custodial Team is grateful for Rev. Michelle's call for thanks to the team and its efforts. The Team consists of Bruce Becker, Don Tucker, Dian Tucker, Bob Johnson, Barry Kent, and Randy Kent.

While it may seem like there are many of us, we can't be everywhere at all times and so we are requesting help from the congregation in a few areas:

- 1. Last people to leave, please turn the lights off. They have been left on in the welcoming area, the hallways, and occasionally the Emerson Room.
- 2. Emerson Room Audio-visual: Both the TV/monitor and the speaker's microphone need to be turned off. Use the power button on the remote for the TV/monitor and the switch on the bottom of the microphone.
- 3. Emerson Room Air-Conditioning: The AC is usually turned off and activated for meetings and Sunday service. Please use the wall mounted thermostats—there are two of them. Press the "system" or "mode" button and set it to "cool." if needed and "off" when the event is over.
- 4. If you unlock the main church door (Chapel entrance) by releasing the crashbar on the inside, PLEASE be sure to reset it. Before leaving, pull the handle from outside to make sure both the right and left-hand sides of the door are locked.

As a side note, we have learned that the Carriage House does not meet Town of Amherst Fire Code as there is no fire escape. That will have to be remedied before anyone can be housed there.

Although it is gone now, for decades the family's business, Fink's Flower Shop and Greenhouse, was a staple for countless local families. In 2017, Elaine restored her family's farm and renamed it Heartland Organics. The farm's new focus is on certified organic specialty mushrooms and vegetables (in season), and carries on the tradition of fresh, cut flowers (also in season).
