

MINISTER'S CORNER

Dear Friends.

The theme for this month is Justice & Equity, which seems extra important for us to have this lens for seeing the world and our place in it, as the presidential election draws near. This month I share the words of Donald E. Robinson, president and founder of Beacon House, a nonprofit, community-based organization that provides social work services to at-risk children and youth in Washington, DC.

Social Justice

Many people use the term social justice in self-serving ways; what they mean by social justice is "just us." But social justice can only begin with the interaction between fortunate people and those who are disadvantaged. It is incumbent upon those who, by virtue of the accident of birth or other circumstances, have good jobs, good educational background, and good lives, to come to the assistance of those who face formidable obstacles to getting an education and leading fulfilling lives.

Social justice insists that people are not their circumstances; they are their possibilities. Social justice demands that all people, regardless of their birth circumstances, are entitled to a fair chance at life, every person has the right to life, liberty, and the pursuit of happiness. - Donald E. BOARD REPORT

The Special Congregational Meeting held on September 15th was a great success. We had 49 voting members attend, more than required under the revised By-Laws. The authorization to spend up to \$80,000 for a new Sanctuary/Chapel heating system to replace the 60-year-old boiler that currently serves that purpose was passed. Thanks to our members who attended the meeting and made this possible.

Thanks also to my fellow members of the Heating Task Force, Bruce Becker, Barry Kent, and Don Tucker whose hard work and dedication over nine long months along with their invaluable experience and knowledge in these matters has made this possible.

Our work is not over as we will now see that the project moves forward to completion.

As explained at the meeting, we are raising money for the project which we hope will only cost \$70,000 and which is \$5,000 less than was raised for our new sign so we know we can do it.

With the heating season approaching we can't wait until all the money is raised to begin the project so we will use funds from the BOT Investment/Asset Account to fund the project while raising money to replenish that account just as one replenishes a personal savings account. We know that other needs for our facilities and programs will arise, so replenishment is mandatory.

One question that arose which was not directly answered at the meeting was why we have not gone to the Endowment Trust (ET) for the money as has been done in the past. In the last couple of years, the Endowment Trust, having reached their goal of one million dollars in funds for investment/principle, has generously contributed to our operating budget from the proceeds of their investments. This is fulfilling the purpose of the ET as stated in their founding documents. We are not able to do without that contribution to our budget and are not going to request a further sum which would likely necessitate them reducing the principle and jeopardize the value of the endowment.

CARING FOR ONE ANOTHER RECIPES Provided by Christine Boczarska and Faith Pham

Christine Boczarska and Faith Pham are sisters and dedicated members of our Caring For One Another group. They provide occasional meals to UU Amherst members on an as-needed basis. With the meal they generally include a "goodie bag" and a card on behalf of the Caring Group. Each month you'll find one of their healthy recipes here in *The Foreword* often incorporating fresh vegetables and even gluten-free.

Blueberries are still in season so this recipe takes advantage of the supply. This came from The Buffalo News

Blueberry Coffee Cake

For streusel topping

6 Tblsp packed light brown sugar 1 teaspoon ground cinnamon Pinch of ground nutmeg 1/4 tsp salt 1/2 cup all purpose flour 4 Tblsp unsalted butter, cold, cut into 1/2 inch chunks

For the cake

6 Tblsp unsalted butter, at room temperature 3/4 cup granulated sugar
2 extra large eggs, at room temperature
1 tsp vanilla extract
Zest and juice from 1 1/2 lemons
2/3 cup full fat sour cream
1 1/4 cups all purpose flour
1 tsp baking powder
1/4 tsp baking soda
Generous pinch of kosher salt
1 1/2 cups fresh blueberries
(an 8 ounce container)
Powdered sugar for garnish (optional)

Preheat oven to 350F. Butter and flour a 9 inch round baking pan. May use parchment paper or a springform pan.

Prepare streusel: Combine brown sugar, cinnamon, nutmeg and salt in a bowl. Add flour then cut the butter in using a pastry blender or two knives, until crumbly. Set aside while you prepare the cake batter.

Prepare the cake: Cream the butter and sugar until creamy, about 4 to 5 minutes using an electric mixer on high speed. Reduce the speed to low and add eggs one at a time until combined. Add vanilla, lemon zest, juice and sour cream. In a separate bowl whisk together the flour, baking powder, baking soda and salt.

With the mixer on low add the flour mixture to the batter and mix until just combined. Using a spatula gently fold in the blueberries making sure the batter is completely mixed.

Spoon the batter into the prepared pan and spread the batter out evenly. Crumble the topping evenly over the batter.

Bake 40 to 50 minutes until a cake tester comes out clean. Cool completely before serving. If desired sprinkle powdered sugar over the top.

2024 United Nations Day Message

24 October is United Nations Day; that is because the United Nations Charter was adopted on that day in 1945 in San Francisco, California. United Nations Headquarters in New York City was not finished until 1952. 2024 is the 79th anniversary of the United Nations. President Franklin Delano Roosevelt, America's thirty-second President, is considered to be the "father of the United Nations." Every year, U.N. Day is celebrated at U.N. Headquarters in New York City and throughout the world. The United States of America should also participate in the celebration by dismantling its global empire and global military machine and by thoroughly making the United Nations the focal point of our foreign policies.

What are the purposes of the United Nations? The main purposes are to save succeeding generations from the scourge of war, to reaffirm faith in fundamental human rights, to recognize the dignity and worth of the human person, to acknowledge the equal rights of men and women and nations large and small, to encourage respect for international law, to promote better standards of life in larger freedom, and to maintain international peace and security.

The United Nations is a noble, humanitarian experiment. Despite all the criticism of the organization, the United Nations has been a relative success. It has prevented another world war, promoted social progress and is in the process of realizing its purposes, principles and reforming itself.

Why is the actual United Nations so different from the U.N. Charter itself? This is a difficult question to answer. Almost all 193 United Nations Member States do not want to subordinate their sovereignty to the United Nations. Consequently, the five permanent members of the U.N. Security Council do not want to elect a first-rate U.N. Secretary-General committed to realizing and strengthening the United Nations Charter. Also, the U.N. is a complex bureaucracy and its international civil service and peacekeepers have many inadequacies. There are also many other problems and dilemmas hampering the United Nations.

All this must change. To realize the U.N. Charter, the United Nations must possess the power to eliminate the scourge of war and promote human rights. To accomplish this, the United Nations must create its own effective system of collective security and a better means for promoting human rights. At the present time, universal and complete disarmament and world peace under U.N. auspices are, unfortunately, unfulfilled dreams.

Nevertheless, on United Nations Day, 24 October, all 193 United Nations Member States and all people should resolve to translate the United Nations Charter into reality in our troubled, interdependent world. The future of humanity depends on an effective United Nations and its ability to maintain international peace and security. The time to make this happen is now; otherwise, the future of humanity is bleak, indeed. As H. G. Wells wrote in *The Outline of History,* "human history becomes more and more a race between education and catastrophe." The problems facing humanity are grave, but human reason and ingenuity can solve them. The United Nations must be made to work and for this to happen, the United States of America must support it. There is no good reason why the history of the future cannot be brighter than the history of the past unless human stupidity and irrationality prevail.
