

BOARD REPORT

As I write this in mid-August, I am looking forward to events in September like the Living Green Festival.

But I need to draw your attention to a new event:

CONGREGATIONAL MEETING SUNDAY SEPTEMBER 15TH AT NOON IN THE CHAPEL.

PURPOSE:

CONGREGATIONAL APPROVAL OF MONIES NEEDED FOR THE NEW HEATING SYSTEM FOR THE CHAPEL/SANCTUARY

The Chapel Heating Task Group has reviewed proposals from four heating contactors their recommendations will be brought to your elected Board of Trustees at their August Meeting. The BOT decision will be presented at the Congregational Meeting and authorization for the spending needed on the project will be put to the Congregation for a vote.

As per the By-Law change voted on by the Congregation at the February 2024 Annual Meeting, a quorum of 25% of the voting members will be required. Both in person and on-line participation will be possible. We hope to have a large level of participation for this important meeting.

Elaine is the owner of Heartland Organics in Niagara County. Located in the heart of Niagara County, NY, her farm was founded in the early 1800s. Although it is gone now, for decades the family's business, Fink's Flower Shop and Greenhouse, was a staple for countless local families. In 2017, Elaine restored her family's farm and renamed it Heartland Organics. The farm's new focus is on certified organic specialty mushrooms and vegetables (in season), and carries on the tradition of fresh, cut flowers (also in season).

JUSTICE ADVOCACY

Learn about Project 2025, the Heritage Foundation's Mandate for Leadership September 15, 12:00 pm

No doubt you've heard about Project 2025, an ultraconservative policy manifesto that seeks to make drastic changes to how the U.S. government has operated for the past century.

Project 2025 is an 800+-page road map that the next and future administrations can implement to systematically eliminate federal agencies, consolidate presidential power, and make Christianity central to government policy. It is often referred to as a roadmap for the first 180 days in office of the next conservative administration.

The report, prepared by more than 400 conservative authors, was spearheaded by the Heritage Foundation think tank, and much of the manifesto is informed by Christian Nationalism. A few highlights of the plan include mass deportation, weakening and/or elimination of federal agencies like the EPA and Department Of Education, and even the National Weather Service.

Join a group of UU Amherst advocates for justice who will share how the many of the provisions of Project 2025 are dangerous, run counter to our UU values' and how these policies would impact average Americans. We'll meet in the Living Room after the service on Sunday, September 15 at noon.

CARING FOR ONE ANOTHER RECIPES

Christine Boczarska and Faith Pham are sisters and dedicated members of our Caring For One Another group. They provide occasional meals to UU Amherst members on an as-needed basis. With the meal they generally include a "goodie bag" and a card on behalf of the Caring Group. Each month you'll find one of their healthy recipes here in *The Foreword* often incorporating fresh vegetables and even gluten-free.

Vegan Baked Beans

1 1/2 hours

1 to 2 Tbsp olive oil

1 medium yellow onion, chopped

4 cloves garlic, minced

3/4 cup molasses

1/2 cup brown sugar

3/4 cup ketchup

3/4 tsp salt

2 Tbsp apple cider vinegar

1 1/2 Tbsp vegan Worcestershire sauce

2 tsp Sriracha

4 15 oz cans of beans, drained and rinsed

Vegan sausage, cooked and crumbled (optional)



Pre-heat oven to 350.

In a large pot warm olive oil over medium heat. Add chopped onion, cook and stir, about five minutes or until soft. Add garlic and cook one minute more.

To the pot add molasses, brown sugar, ketchup, salt, vinegar, Worcestershire and sriracha. Stir well and add the beans (and sausage, if using).

Transfer to a large casserole dish, cover with foil and bake for 1 hour.

Note: You may omit the sriracha if you prefer a milder taste. You can use any combination of beans so long as they are not pre-flavored. We used navy, great northern and speckled kidney beans. This recipe was inspired by a dish prepared for our UU picnic which was delicious and went so well with the hot dog/hamburger menu.

ENDOWMENT TRUST



Last month's article focused on the Endowment Trust's history. Created in 1989 and incorporated in 1994 as a separate 501c3 organization, the trust's purpose is to invest and manage gifts and bequests made to the Endowment by UU Amherst members and others to attain sufficient principal to generate income that may be used to assist the Church in operating and capital expenses. A visible display of Endowment Trust donors can be found on the West wall of the Atrium. Donors'

contributions are accumulated and as a specific donation level is reached a different color leaf is added to the tree with their name on it (500+ Yellow, \$2,000 Light Gold, \$5,000 Bronze, \$10,000 Steel, \$20,000 Gold).

The Endowment Trust also has a Legacy Society. Over the past month, Endowment Trustee have been updating the original list of Church members who made commitments to include UU Amherst in their will. If you have included the Endowment Trust in your will or would like more information about this, please talk to one of your Endowment Trustees. 
