Being a Unitarian Universalist, a faith that is intentionally expansive, can be a little bit complicated: How do we explain a pluralism that welcomes spiritual traditions and practices whose center is Love? At a time when the nation seems more polarized than at any other time in our lifetimes, how do we make space for and honor traditions that may not mirror our own? These questions seem especially pertinent during the month of December.



This year there are five major holidays during December that we pause to acknowledge:

- 12/8 is "Bodhi Day" celebrated by Buddhists as the day when the Buddha received enlightenment.
- 12/21 thru 1/1 is "Yule" celebrated by Earth-loving people (Pagans, Wiccans, and so many more). Yule begins with the Winter Solstice, the longest night of the year, when the Earth itself seems to slow down to receive the newborn light.
- 12/24 & 12/25 are "Christmas" celebrated by Christians as the coming of the Christ child, and celebrated culturally as a time for gift giving and generosity.
- 12/26 thru 1/1 is "Kwanzaa" celebrated by African American people as a celebration of cultural heritage and traditional values.
- 12/26 thru 1/2 is "Hanukkah" celebrated by Jewish people in commemoration of the liberation and rededication of the Holy Temple in Jerusalem in the second century BCE. (Since Jewish holidays begin at sundown, Hanukkah actually begins on 12/25.)

Various UU congregations may offer moments of recognition during Sunday services, or offer times for reflection through online messages or small gatherings, depending on the make-up of their congregation. In Faith Development, children might learn about these traditions and engage in small rituals, like pouring tea over a statue of the Buddha for Bodhi Day. In North America, Christmas might not need much explaining, but perhaps some contextualization in a month that includes many celebrations.

Whatever holidays/holy days you do or do not participate in, may this month that finds many faith communities celebrating the return of the light and the hope for peace and good will, be meaningful for you and yours.

Rev. Michelle put together a great program which included a congratulatory Proclamation from the Town of Amherst delivered by Councilwoman, Jacqualine Berger, video congratulations from Rev. Dr. Sofia Betancourt, UUA President and Rev. Renee Ruchotzke, CER, as well as many songs played by vocalist and pianist Adam Schmidt. It's a great help in putting together a program when your minister is a former theatre director! Thanks, Michelle.



Also, thanks to all those who attended, your presence helped make the evening the great success it was.

THEATER LOVERS



CARING FOR ONE ANOTHER RECIPES

Christine Boczarska and Faith Pham are sisters and dedicated members of our Caring For One Another group. They provide occasional meals to UU Amherst members on an as-needed basis. With the meal they generally include a "goodie bag" and a card on behalf of the Caring Group. Each month you'll find one of their healthy recipes here in *The Foreword* often incorporating fresh vegetables and even gluten-free.

Pumpkin Pie

2 pie crusts, either homemade or frozen

1 1/2 cups pumpkin (steamed or canned)

1 can evaporated milk (1 1/2 cups)

1/2 cup brown sugar

1/2 cup white sugar or honey

1/4 tsp salt

1 tsp cinnamon

1/2 tsp ginger

1/4 tsp cloves

1/2 tsp nutmeg

4 slightly beaten eggs

2 Tbsp melted butter

1 pint of heavy whipping cream, whipped



Beat eggs and add remaining ingredients. Mix thoroughly. Pour into unbaked pastry shells and bake 10 minutes in 475° oven. Reduce heat to 350 and bake long enough for filling to set - knife should come out clean when inserted into custard. Cool for an hour then garnish with whipped cream. The pie turns out not as sweet as a bought pie and the spicing is more subtle.

ENDOWMENT TRUST

The holiday season brings thoughts of joy and gratitude, and there's no better time to express our thanks and sincere appreciation for all that you do for UU Amherst. Your donations to the Endowment Trust reflect your commitment to insuring the future of our beloved community. It enabled the Endowment to contribute \$51,000 to the congregation's annual operating budget this year. At the 2024 Annual Meeting, the congregation approved of the Endowment's commitment to provide up

to the UU Amherst up to 5% of the total value of unrestricted funds for the operating budget. The Endowment will again be able to contribute up to \$51,000 in 2025.

The December 31st IRS deadline for tax deductions will be here before you realize it. We encourage you to discuss year-end charitable actions with your financial, tax, and legal advisors and to explore the related resources to help you increase your charitable impact and reduce your taxable income. Please keep the Endowment in mind.

As of October 31st, the total value of our funds with Level Wealth Management was \$1,029,672.76, with an additional \$5,000 in Citizen Bank. Garden Bed Management: We will plan ways to build simplicity and beauty into our bed, so they are easy to maintain and enjoyable to all.

With this expansion, we aim to work in a coordinated manner. While I will continue to lead our Garden Planting/Tending group, Pam Kent will take the lead in overseeing the Grounds portion and serve as the main point of communication with the board, representing our collective goals and needs, and will enhance our campus's beauty and improve our gardening practices.
