

Change is Inevitable; Melting Down is Not

The following is an excerpt from an essay written by UU Administrator, Elaine Harrigan, and posted in the Medium publication, Mindfulness Matters.

It's a little more than a week into the new year, and already my life has been rocked by family drama. But these incidents will feel like



tiny snowflakes compared to the blizzard that's coming for our country. I'm exhausted from change and would love a nice quiet month to recover, drink tea, and binge watch British mysteries.

Breathe, I tell myself. Change is a constant.

Nature reminds us that change is cyclical; seasons turn from birth to death to rebirth.

How do we keep from melting down when change forces its way into our lives? What can nature, itself, teach us about staying centered?

Cultivating a Fertile Inner Landscape

Shamanic teachers, Sandra Ingerman and LLyn Roberts, authors of *Speaking with Nature*, *Awakening to the Deep Wisdom of the Earth*, write about the transformative power of the wild. In connecting with nature, Ingerman says, we can cultivate a fertile inner landscape that provides strength, resilience, joy, and hope.

A practice that I've found to be most helpful is *terra divina* or "reading the earth." Based on an ancient monastic practice, terra divina unfolds through four steps of observation and reflection that draw us into a deep connection with nature through sensory mindfulness.

By immersing in the unique sounds of the wild, its scents, colors, and textures as the seasons change, nature becomes our holy text; our wisdom teacher for cultivating an inner landscape that sustains us when facing the unknown. Nature can be our antidote to the uncertainties of life.

BOARD REPORT

February promises to be a warmer month, at least in our chapel. The installation of the new boiler heating system began late in the second week of January and we expect that the work will be completed in early February. It's very timely as this looks to be a cold winter and the current system has developed a small leak. Thanks to our generous donors we have \$50,000 of the expected \$70,000 cost of the project and, of course, we are still accepting donations.

The Finance Committee and the Board of Trustees (BOT) are working on our operating budget for 2025 so please get your pledge in, if you have not already done so. We need to know how much to expect before finalizing the budget for 2025.



On Sunday, February 23rd, we will hold our Annual Meeting where we will vote on the budget, our contribution to the UUA, and several by-law changes as well as nominees to serve on the BOT, the Endowment Trust, and the Leadership Development and Nominating Committee.

Just a reminder that in order to vote at the Annual Meeting you need to have made a payment towards your 2024 pledge and made a pledge of financial support for 2025.



CALENDAR RESERVATION & FACILITY USE REMINDER

When reserving dates for group meetings, it's very important that you follow these guidelines to avoid confusion regarding dates, times, and room you want to reserve:

- All reservation requests MUST BE VIA EMAIL This is the only way the Administrator has of confirming
 who requested the date and the purpose, and ensures your request is added to the calendar. Phone
 calls asking about available dates are welcome—please follow-up by email with all details.
- Check the Google calendar on the UU Amherst website to be sure there are no other events already
 scheduled on the day/time you are requesting. Rentals by non-members and dates scheduled for
 Havurah services CANNOT BE CHANGED because deposits or fees put a hold on the date/time. Please
 also be aware that no one should be in the building when Havurah is holding a service for security
 reasons. They often use the Chapel and Emerson Room. There will be a notice about upcoming services
 in the Weekly Update and an All Church sent if needed.
- Please assign only ONE PERSON as the event liaison who is responsible for requesting dates/times.
 Errors occur when the Administrator receives contradictory information from more than one person.
- Do not assume a flyer posted in the lobby or notice sent via All Church reserves a date/time for an event or meeting. Dates on the calendar can ONLY be reserved by written request to the Administrator. If you have not received a confirmation from the Administrator, then your meeting has not been scheduled.
- When requesting a reservation, be sure to include: purpose or name of the event (i.e., FD Meeting),
 meeting time and FULL TIME you need the space, especially if set-up/clean-up is involved. Meeting
 times are used for Weekly Update and monthly newsletter; the full time you need the space is used for
 the Google calendar. (Ex: Meeting time: 9 am-11 am; room reservation 8:30 am-11:30 am).
- Be aware that you may be asked to move your meeting from the Emerson Room to another space if a
 larger group meeting, memorial service, or rental that requires the kitchen needs use of Emerson on
 the same date/time. While church policy states that UU programs/events take precedent over outside
 rentals, the potential for receiving earned income needs to be considered. Another reason why it's very
 important to check the website calendar before requesting a date!
- Much of the above applies to personal/private member use of the facilities, as well. Members are
 provided a discounted rate but MUST go through the proper process of receiving and returning a signed
 agreement form and paying a deposit if necessary. Members in all cases are responsible for set-up/
 clean-up of spaces used. (NOTE: Members' rates are intended for events, parties, or gatherings in
 which the member is the host. It should not be passed on to non-members. Non-profit rates are
 available if they apply.)



ENDOWMENT TRUST

A comprehensive review of the Endowment Trust activities for 2024 will be included in the Annual Report distributed for the Annual Meeting at the end of February. It reveals that your Endowment Trustees have exercised their fiduciary responsibilities well on your behalf over the course of the past year.

The investment portfolio's value at the end of the 2024 fiscal year was \$1,149,981; \$27,690 are restricted funds for the Music Committee. As a result of the investment gains, the Endowment will again be able to contribute

\$51,000 to the church operating budget. The checking account has about \$5,000.

At the Annual Meeting, you will have the opportunity to vote for TWO Endowment Trustees. Dian Tucker, who stepped in to finish 2024 portion of Dorothy Reade's term that expires in 2027, has been nominated to a five year term (2030). Eric Groat has been nominated to complete the balance of Dorothy Reade's term (2027). Lauraine Marcus will be leaving the Endowment.

Endowment Trust meetings are quarterly. A date for the April meeting will appear in the newsletter. The Trustees ask you to keep this wise maxim in mind:

"We pick fruit from trees we did not plant. We drink water from wells we did not dig. This is as it should be, so long as we dig and plant for those who will come after us."

CARING FOR ONE ANOTHER RECIPES

With the meal they generally include a "goodie bag" and a card on behalf of the Caring Group. Each month you'll find one of their healthy recipes here in *The Foreword* often incorporating fresh vegetables and even gluten-free.

Butternut Squash Soup

1 1/2 hours 4 servings

2 Tbsp butter

1 small onion, chopped

1 stalk of celery chopped

1 medium carrot, chopped

2 medium potatoes, peeled and cubed

1 medium butternut squash, or any sweet winter squash,

peeled, seeded and cubed

32 oz chicken stock or vegetable stock

Salt and pepper



Melt butter in a large pot on medium heat. Add onion, celery and carrot and sauté until soft, about 5 to 10 minutes. Add the cubed potatoes and squash and enough stock to cover the vegetables. Bring to a boil, reduce heat to low, cover pot and simmer for 40 minutes or until the vegetables are tender. Using a blender or immersion blender, purée. Mix in any remaining stock to get the desired consistency. Season with salt and pepper. Serve with sour cream or yogurt and hearty bread. This soup freezes well
