

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

Dr. Culton will also discuss some recent trends in religious identification in the US and some thoughts about his present research that is based on interviews with UU members.

But the dance can also change you for the better, leaving you more humble and honest, more thoughtful and creative, more compassionate and courageous...more human and alive. As we move into the New Year, I look forward to continuing the progress we have made in building our congregational community with more families with children and more new members than we have had in some time. We now have a Faith Development Director and a choir contributing to our community. The Adopt-an-Angel program for the children at Gateway, our neighbor to the east, was a success (see page 11 of this newsletter). Many thanks to Marie Evans, Dian Tucker, Ruth Bowen, and Linda Joy Groat, and all those who contributed gifts.

The room that will contain our new boiler for heating the chapel has been completed and we await the arrival of one of the pumps needed for that system before it will be installed. We expect that the boiler installation construction will begin in January and I hope it will be completed before our Annual Meeting on Sunday, February 23rd. We are still accepting donations to defray the cost of the new boiler system.

Speaking of heating systems, the furnace that heats the first floor of our new Admin Wing which contains our offices needed work. This has led to it being made more efficient. We will no longer have to run the furnace fan continuously to provide heat thus saving energy and reducing our costs.

We have received the Wendel Architectural and Engineering Report, and we will begin sharing it with the congregation and discussing the options it presents.

2025 promises to be another eventful year for us all with more progress made.

If you have a meeting or event at church, please remember:


- Restore the room to its original state (or better)

Doing so will help focus your efforts, strengthen communication with potential participants about what you are offering, and help us understand what you are offering. Which purposes best fit your activity/ class?

- a. Learning & Sharing: participants will learn new skills or gain knowledge
- b. Connection: participants will develop or strengthen relationships with each other
- c. **Belonging:** participants will feel a deeper sense of belonging to UU Amherst and/or Unitarian Universalism
- a. Transformation: participants may experience a new sense of agency, worldview, or self
- b. Capacity Building: participants will become newly equipped to care for our congregation

AMHERST LITTLE FREE PANTRY

If you're making in-kind (grocery) donations, please keep in mind that the pantry is outdoors and we'd prefer dry goods as much as possible - breakfast cereal, pasta, side dish mixes, baking mixes, oatmeal packets, coffee, and hot chocolate mix packets. As we head into freezing temperatures, we put out only tuna in oil.

Keep sending in canned fruit, shelf-stable milk, Chef Boyardee products, soups, and pasta sauce – whatever we stock is taken quickly each day. Peanut butter is another constant need. Baked or refried beans have low water content and are slower to freeze than other canned beans. The pantry will not be stocking toothpaste or tuna in water until spring, but we have indoor storage for any that are donated in the meantime.

ENDOWMENT TRUST

2025 begins with so much uncertainty and anxiety. UU Amherst must continue its active presence as the alternative/refuge, promoting its values of democracy, justice, transformation, interdependence, generosity, plurality and equity. It can only persist with your generosity. As is often said during Sunday Service:

We pick fruit from trees we did not plant;

We drink water from wells we did not dig;

This is as it should be, as long as we dig and plant for those who come after us.

Become a member of the Legacy Society by letting the Endowment know that you have included a bequest to the UUCA Endowment Trust in your will. Make the Endowment Trust the beneficiary of one of your financial assets, like life insurance, IRA, brokerage accounts, or trust. Lower your tax burden by donating directly from an IRA in the form of a Qualified Charitable Deduction (QCD). You can also give through a Donor Advised Fund. If you have any questions about any of these ways of giving, please talk to our treasurer, Barry Kent.

As of November 30th, the total value of our funds with Level Wealth Management was \$1,181,263.78 with an additional \$5,000 in the Citizen Bank account. CARING FOR ONE ANOTHER RECIPES

Christine Boczarska and Faith Pham are sisters and dedicated members of our Caring For One Another group. They provide occasional meals to UU Amherst members on an as-needed basis. With the meal they generally include a "goodie bag" and a card on behalf of the Caring Group. Each month you'll find one of their healthy recipes here in *The Foreword* often incorporating fresh vegetables and even gluten-free.

The following is perfect comfort food for the cold days of winter

Skillet Chicken Potpie

- 1 1/2 cups low-sodium chicken broth divided
- 1 Tb all-purpose flour
- 1 Tb olive oil
- 8 oz cremini mushrooms, sliced
- 1 cup chopped onions
- 6 cloves garlic, minced
- 1 1/2 cups frozen carrots and peas
- 1 Tb chopped fresh sage
- 1 Tb fresh thyme leaves
- 1/2 tsp salt
- 1/2 tsp ground pepper
- 1 lb shredded cooked chicken (about 3 cups)
- 1 (7-8 oz) prepared pie crust, thawed if frozen
- 1 egg white, lightly beaten



Preheat oven to 425°. Whisk 1 1/4 cups of broth and flour in a medium bowl; set aside.

Heat oil in a 10-inch skillet over medium heat. Add mushrooms; cook until browned, 6-8 minutes. Reduce heat to medium. Add onion and garlic; cook until tender about 4-6 minutes,

Stir in the remaining broth, scraping up any browned bits. Stir in the reserved broth-flour mixture, peas and carrots, sage, thyme, sale and pepper. Bring to a boil, stirring constantly. Reduce heat and cook, stirring occasionally, until the vegetables are tender, about 10 minutes. Remove from heat; stir in chicken.

Lay pie crust over the chicken mixture, folding the edges over as needed. Cut 4-inch slits in the crust to allow steam to escape. Brush with egg white. Bake until the crust is golden and the filling is bubbly, 20-25 minutes. Let cool 10 minutes before serving.

UU Amherst is the home of one of her fiber arts. The large weaving can be found in the chapel/sanctuary, just as you enter. In a room that is dominated by windows, it must have been difficult to find a space to accommodate the large tapestry.

Next time you're at UU Amherst and entering the chapel, look up! And then look around. We are blessed with so much artistry throughout the building: weavings, paintings, photographs, carpentry. Open yourself to the abundance that has been so generously shared for your pleasure and upliftment.



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
