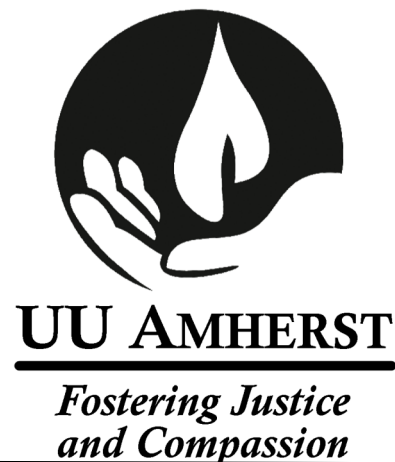

MINISTER’S CORNER

Well, we could not have chosen a more apt theme for this month than “Change.” I don’t know how y’all who are glued to media outlets are coping with the roller coaster ride we are currently not enjoying. I read what is essentially the mc nuggets of news, and it’s almost more than I can take.

I think perhaps it is time to reread Octavia Butler’s two-book series, *The Parable of the Sower* and *The Parable of the Talents*. The first of these books teaches a kind of process theology that I can get behind: “All that you touch you Change. All that you Change, Changes you. The only lasting truth is Change. God is Change.” The second book is eerily prescient as it describes a time in the future (what we call today) that reads like the news I referenced above.

This is a good time to remind ourselves that Change can nudge us out of stuck patterns and awaken our spirits, open our eyes, and help us raise our voices. And I recognize that Change can be anxiety-producing, which does not always bring out our best selves. I suggest we embrace these words from Rev. Erik Walker Wikstrom: *In this place with these people, May we listen so that we can hear; May we hear so that we can feel; May we feel so that we can know; and May we know so that we can change ourselves and the world.*

Kim Diana Connolly (and her beloved children Tayte and Simon) have been members of UUAmherst since 2010. Kim Diana has served our community in various ways, including in the (old) Faith Development wing and on the Nominating and Leadership Development Committee. Kim Diana is also active in the UUA Central Eastern Region Summer Institute on its Committee on Ministry, and has attended the UUA General Assembly as a delegate for our congregation multiple times. She was elected in 2023 to serve on the national UUA Board of Review, and this summer she will be co-chairing the GA Covenant Team in Baltimore. By day, she is a law professor at SUNY's University at Buffalo, teaching future lawyers and working as hard as she can for environmental justice and access to justice for those who cannot afford a lawyer.

BOARD REPORT

For the last several years we have set up task forces for very specific purposes, some examples include: language for the new sign; the chapel heating task force, and the renovation of the first floor Admin/FD wing—all very successful. Currently Don Tucker is heading the Buildings and Facilities Task Force that is studying the Wendel Architectural Report and will make recommendations as to the future of our buildings.

At a recent meeting of that task force two other issues arose that required the formation of more task forces which has led the BOT to establish a formal Task Force Policy as shown below.

"From time to time the need for a Task Force arises to address specific concerns. The BOT may decide to form a Task Force or members of the Congregational Community may come to the BOT and suggest a Task Force is needed for a specific purpose. In any case all Task Forces must be authorized and approved by the BOT. The BOT will discuss the scope of the Task Force and the questions to be dealt with by the Task Force. The Task Force will designate a liaison to the BOT to keep the BOT informed of their activities and the Task Force will bring their recommendations to the BOT which will decide on how to proceed."

Additionally, the BOT has voted to establish two more task forces:

The Carriage House and Caretaker Task Force, headed by Dian Tucker, to look into what repairs or improvements may be needed to maintain the Carriage House and investigate the possibility of again having an on-site Caretaker.

The ADA Compliant Bathroom Task Force, headed by Bargara Gauger-Kent, to look into the possibility of creating a wheelchair accessible bathroom on the first floor of the Admin/FD Wing.

Please contact the Task Force Leaders if you are interested in serving on either or both of those Task Forces.

NEW GRANT COORDINATION POLICY

Recently it was brought to the attention of the BOT that there were four separate grant proposals made from UUCA/UUA , including three to the same funding source, all prepared separately with no awareness or coordination between them.

The BOT voted to establish a new policy to prevent a reoccurrence:

"In the interest of good governance, it has become necessary to provide greater coordination of the various multiple grant proposals made for the benefit of the UUCA. All those wanting to apply for grants for the benefit of the UUCA/UUA will bring their proposal(s) to the Finance Committee for review no later than one month before their grant proposal is due. The Finance Committee will then bring their findings to BOT for their approval."

As mentioned above, we haven't decided on a topic yet for May 25, but the plan is to meet off-site at Bestcellar Book Bar, 9560 Main Street, Clarence (across from Clarence High School at Gunnville Rd) in their semi-private room.

Lending Library has expanded! The brown bookshelf in the Library/Living Room has social justice and children's books. You can check out what you like by writing your name, the title, and expected return date in the notebook on the shelf. UU history and practice, as well as world religions, are still located in the glass curio cabinet in the Emerson Room, with its own sign-out notebook.

The Work That Reconnects Immersion Workshop Sunday, April 6th, Noon to 4:00 pm Emerson Room

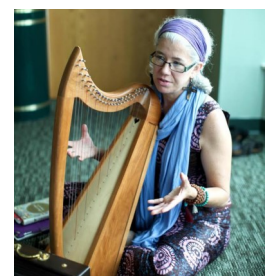
Are you feeling Overwhelmed? Fearful? Angry? Despairing? You are not alone! Learn to stay engaged without burning out.

You are warmly invited to UU Amherst for a workshop about The Work That Reconnects on Sunday, April 6, from noon to 4 pm, to offer support and share tools that will help you cope. The Work That Reconnects is a framework for personal and social change in the face of overwhelming crisis—a way of transforming despair and apathy into collaborative action. This set of practices was developed by eco-Buddhist scholar and humanitarian, Joanna Macy. It provides a safe and supportive space for individuals to explore and express their emotions about the state of the world, while also fostering a sense of connection and empowerment.

During this immersive session, participants will explore moving through the components of the Spiral of The Work That Reconnects: Ground in Gratitude, Honoring Our Pain, Seeing with New Eyes, and Going Forth. The Practices that guide us through the Spiral include Somatic Movement, Simple Songs, Facilitated Conversations and Small Group Discussions, and Guided Meditations

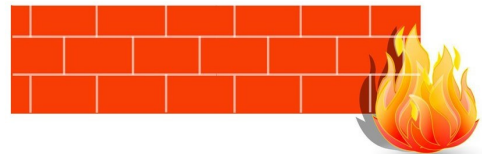

Duality of Safety

I have been thinking a lot about the meaning of safety in community lately. So, instead of a blessing this month, I'd like to offer a thought:

We all want to feel safe to be ourselves, safe to speak our truth, safe to show up just as we are. That's what real community is about: creating a space where people can trust that they'll be met with kindness, respect, and care. It's not always easy but when we commit to listening, learning, and making room for each other, we build a truly sacred place where everyone belongs.

At the same time, safety also means knowing when to set boundaries. Being open and welcoming doesn't mean we have to accept harm or hatred. We can stand for love and justice while also protecting ourselves and each other from those who would do us harm. Holding this balance takes wisdom and courage, but it's possible. We can create spaces that are both compassionate and strong, both open-hearted and protected—because real safety means looking out for one another in every way that matters.

CARING FOR ONE ANOTHER RECIPES Provided by Christine Boczarska and Faith Pham

Christine Boczarska and Faith Pham are sisters and dedicated members of our Caring For One Another group. They provide occasional meals to UU Amherst members on an as-needed basis. With the meal they generally include a “goodie bag” and a card on behalf of the Caring Group. Each month you’ll find one of their healthy recipes here in *The Foreword* often incorporating fresh vegetables and even gluten-free.

Tuscan White Bean Soup

Prep 15 minutes
Cook time 2 hours

1 medium onion, diced
3 carrots, sliced
4 stalks celery, sliced
3 cloves garlic, sliced
4 cups chopped kale
14 oz can diced tomatoes
3 can white beans , drained, rinsed
(a mix of several kinds is good)
1 teaspoon dried thyme
1 teaspoon dried oregano
6 cups vegetable stock
Salt and pepper to taste



Cook the kale in 1/2 the stock in a soup pot for 1 hour or until tender. Then put all the remaining ingredients in the pot and cook on medium heat until all the vegetables are soft.

Serve over rice or noodles.

This is an easy recipe, nutritious and delicious. Enjoy!
